We wish to join with the Board in paying tribute to this great man of God for his Christian witness and his life of service.




# board of trustees and president strive for progress

To prepare students for effective lay work, Christos offers an experience in conducting services, in canvassing, and in other practical methods of Christian service


Besides canvassing in Benton Harbor and elsewhere, the club sent a carload of young people to Rice Creek each Sunday to work in the Sunday School.

The timeless cultures of Asia are depicted in the curvacious motions of the graceful temple dancers of Thailand and Burma, in the serpentine Great Wall of China, and in the majestic Taj Mahal of India. The bizarre oriental marketplace crowded with persian rugs, teakwood, ivory, spices, and wool from Kashmir; hunch-backed coolies bent over planting rice shoots in the flooded paddies; and the devout offering milk to the sacred cow, reflect the diversity of life from Bombay to Tokyo. Elephants, tigers, water-buffalos, monkeys, bronze buddhas, Hindu priests, and Shinto shrines are each a part of the silk-screen mural of the Orient. As the teeming millions living in Calcutta, Hong Kong, Bangkok, Rangoon, Singapore, and Shanghai represent a mixture of peoples, so also do the students of Spring Arbor represent a variety of backgrounds, since they come from many different states.

It was in Japan that one of Spring Arbor's students, Mr. Dale Cryderman, Jr., lived while his parents ministered to the people there in 1954-56. Presently, Jim and Leone (Tjepkema) Taylor ('47-'48, '49-'50) are missionaries on the island of Taiwan, just a few miles from the Communist controlled mainland of Red China.

Their weekly prayer meetings were a blessing to each class member and were a help in keeping the spiritual fires glowing on campus.


Their junior play, "Christmas at Home." thrilled the audience and indicated the effort they put

### fall retreat: hikes, new friends, sports, antics






### winter banquet a fantasy in frost

## chapel





The second semester brought with it many changes. As usual there were some students who didn't return; but there were also many new students who came to the campus at the beginning of the semester.



In the first tournament game, SAHS scored a basket in the final seconds to come out on top of Concord, 57 - 56. However, they bowed out to Cement City the following night.




