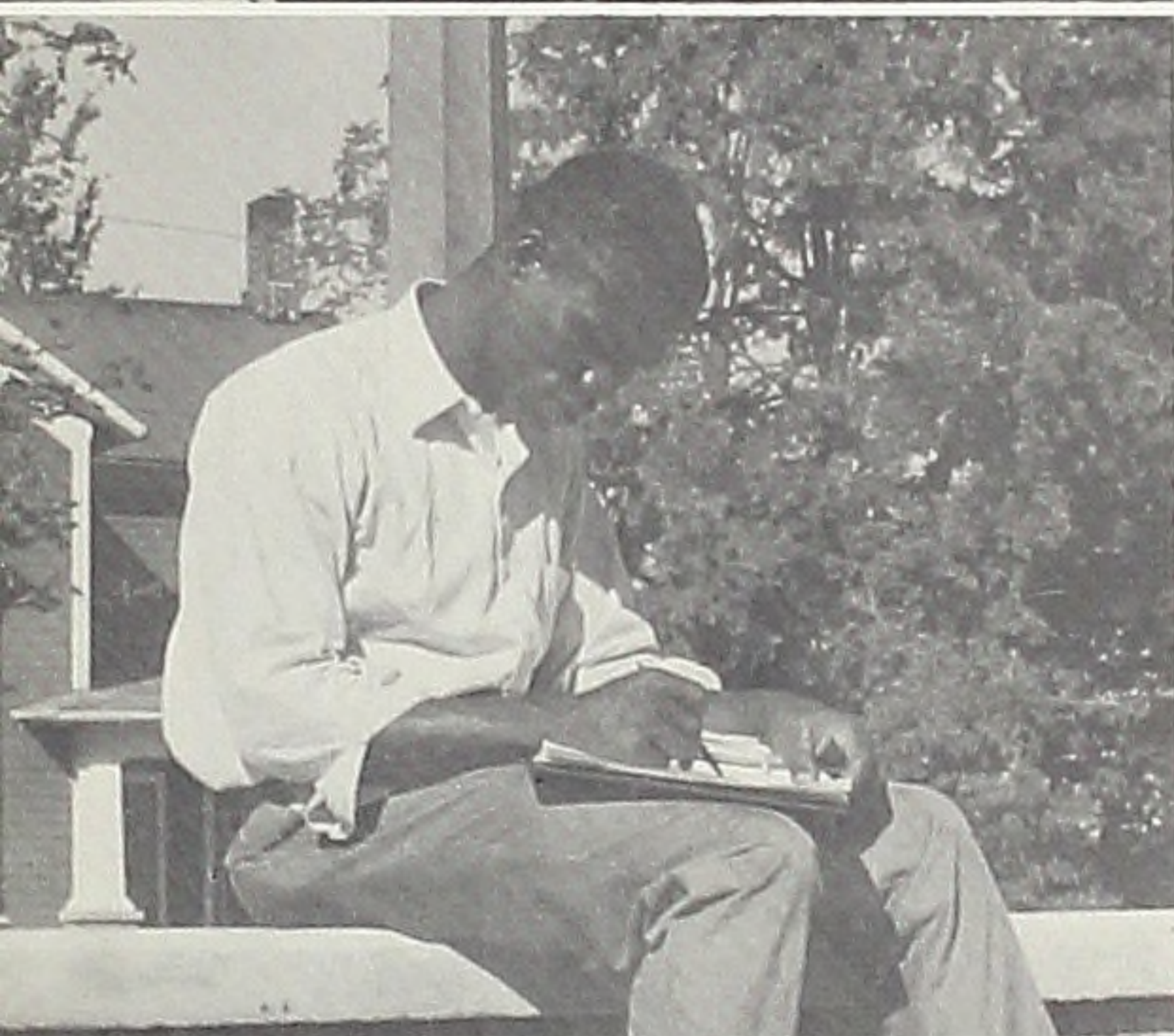
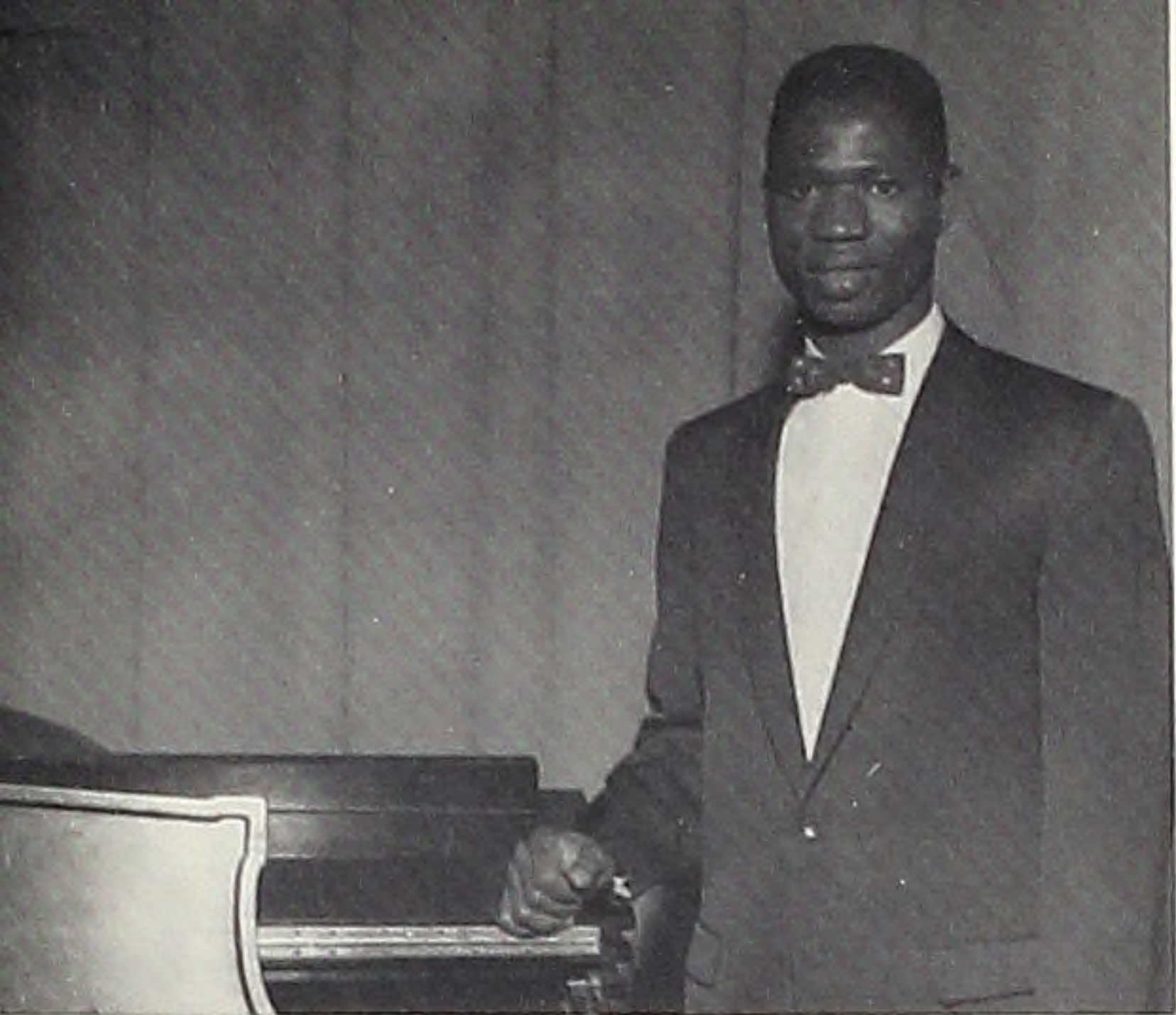
# ECHO 1961

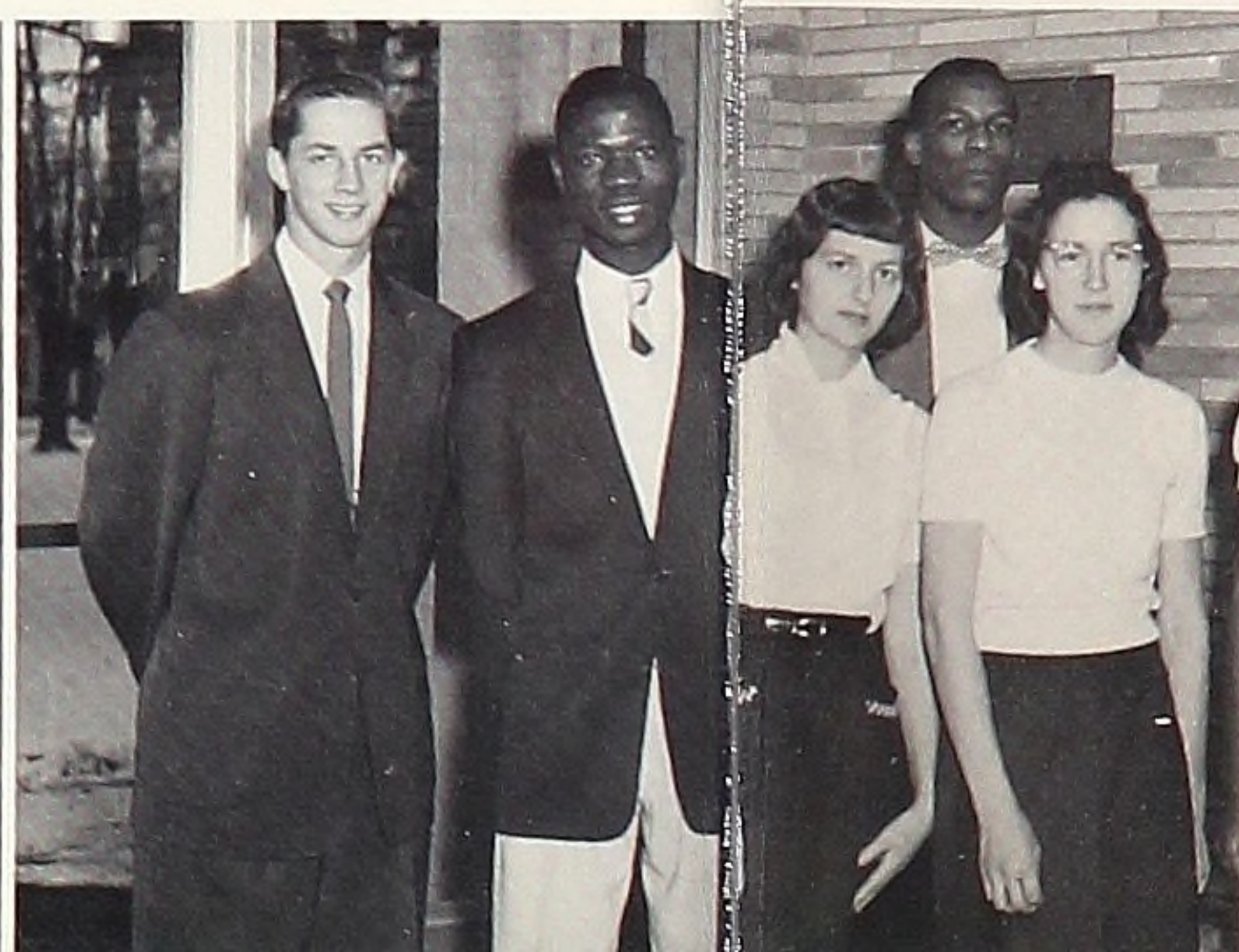
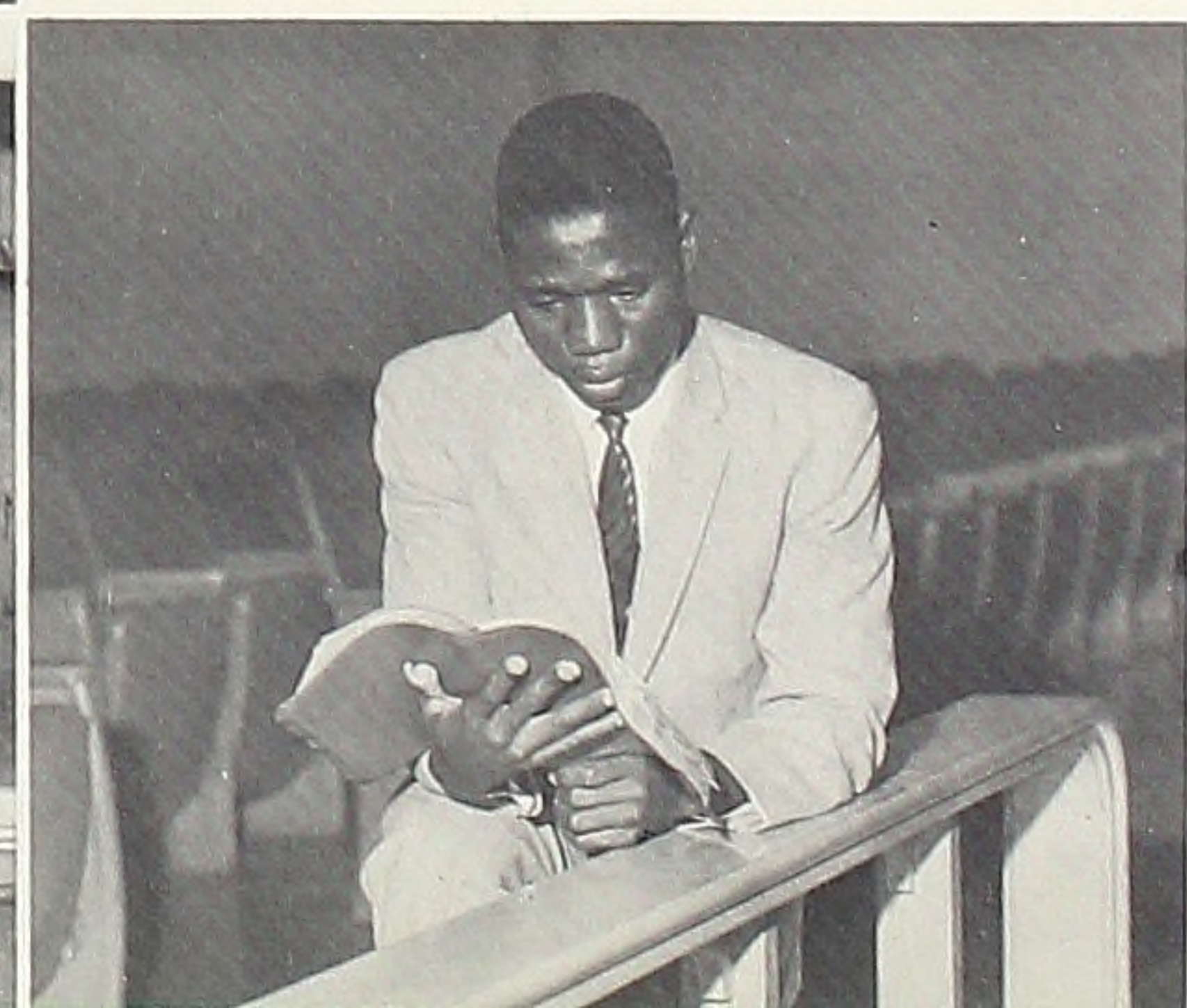
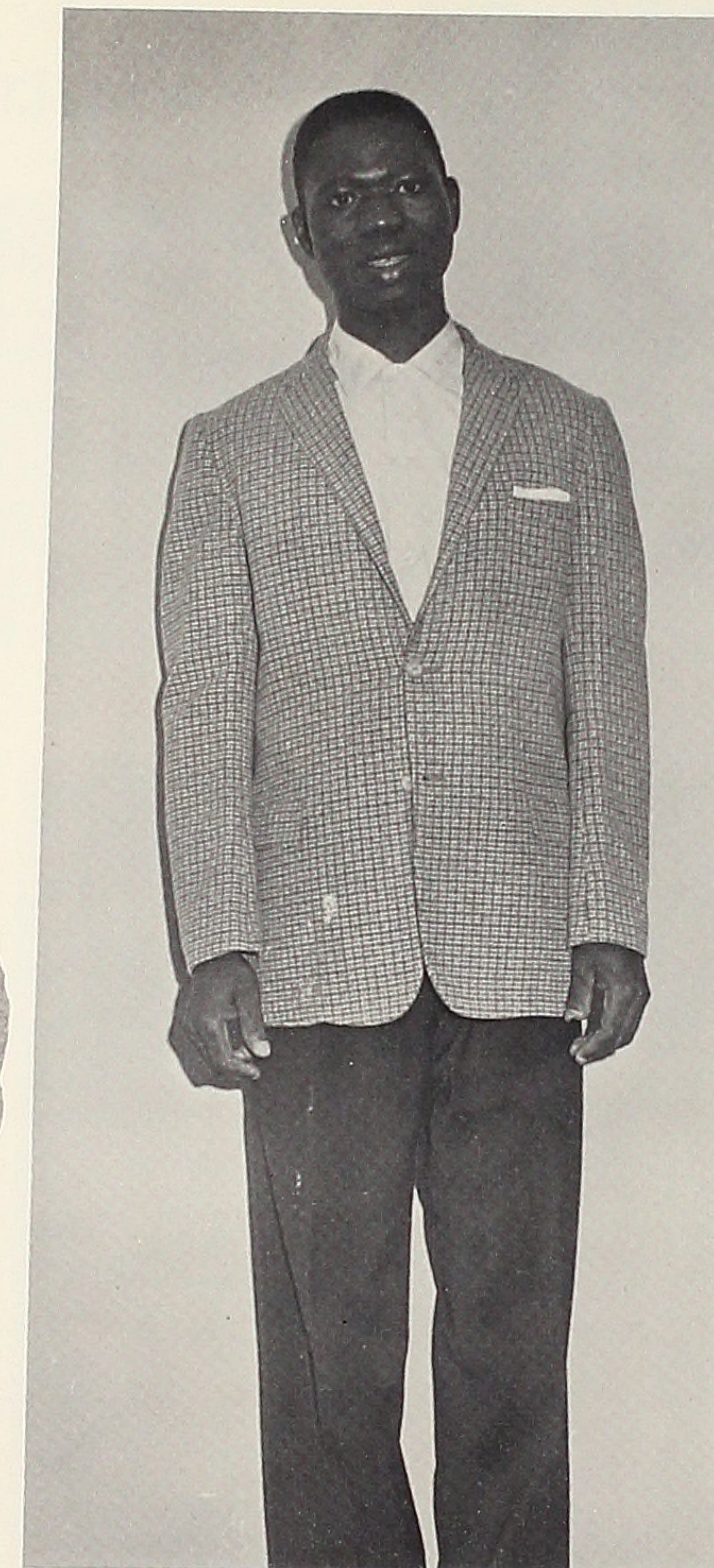
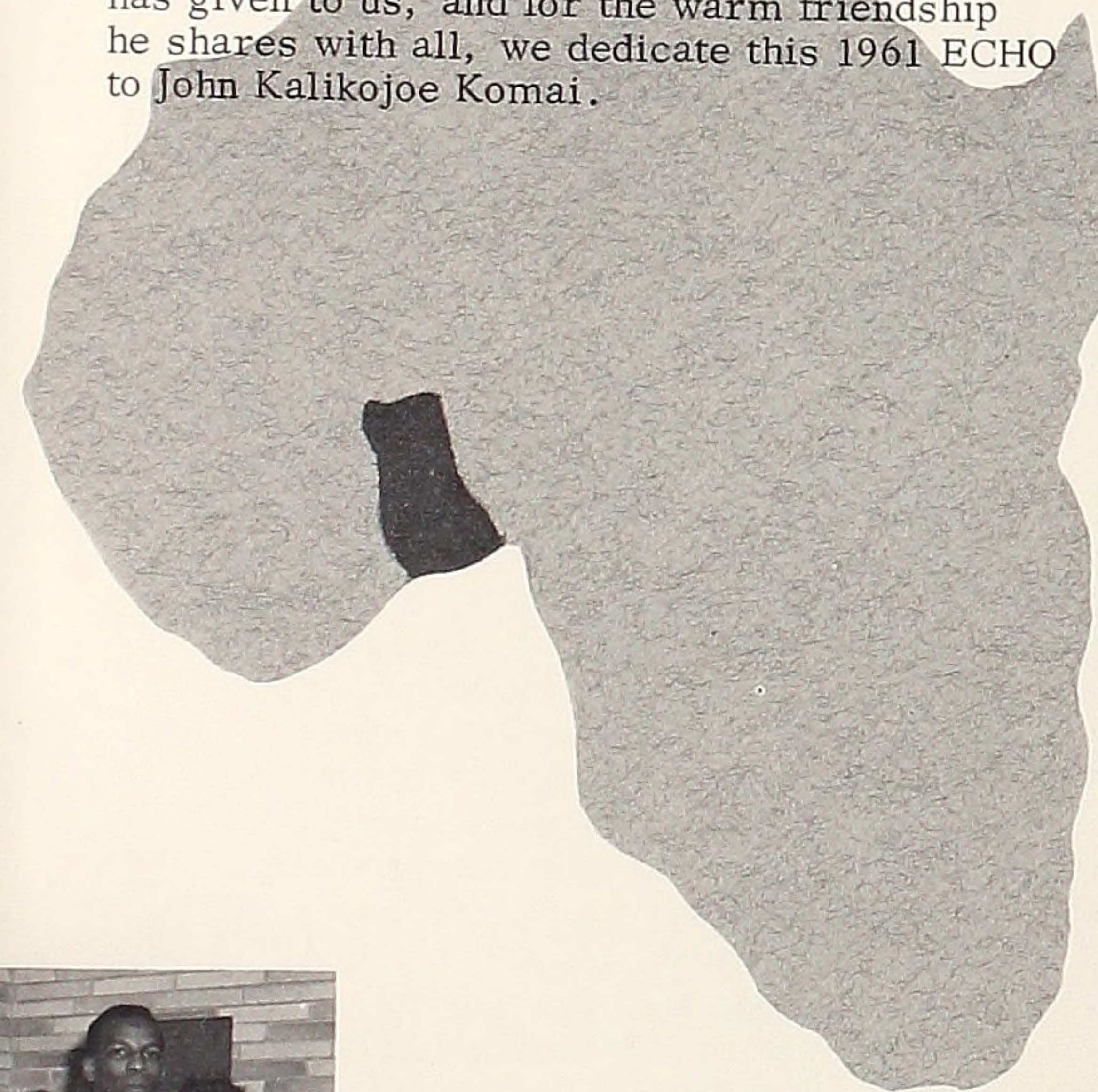
Jungle drums, cobras, and wild animals made life in a Gold Coast village an exciting adventure for Putu Prince, John Komai. Born on November 11, 1936, as the first son of an African chieftan, John began preparing throughout his younger years for the time when he would rule over the Putu tribe in succession to his father.

But in 1949 ways began opening for John to obtain an education: first at a mission school in Penoke, Liberia, where he found Christ as his personal Saviour, and then at LeTourneaus where he met Ed and Judy Jones, a Free Methodist couple from East Peoria, Illinois. As the school year closed, the Jones' believed John should come back to America with them and attend Spring Arbor High School.

With apprehensions and fears, and yet with a faith in God, John came to the United States in 1955, to continue toward the medical missionary career to which he felt called. During his years in Spring Arbor, his experiences, and Christian

service have encompassed a great variety of tasks and activities. Photography Club, Ministerial, Foreign Missions Fellowship, Student Council, Speech, Oratorio, and A Cappella Choir have claimed him as an asset at different times and John has enriched each of their programs by giving diligently of his efforts. John has also had many speaking and preaching engagements, since he has gone out on his own on weekends, giving his energies to Christian service. But, perhaps, his most admirable trait is his spiritual leadership. Not only have his positions as class chaplain, and Religious Activities Chairman made him a blessing to others, but more so has been his daily, consistent Christian witness.

For all the efforts he has put forth for Spring Arbor, for all the blessings and inspiration he has given to us, and for the warm friendship he shares with all, we dedicate this 1961 ECHO to John Kalikojoe Komai.

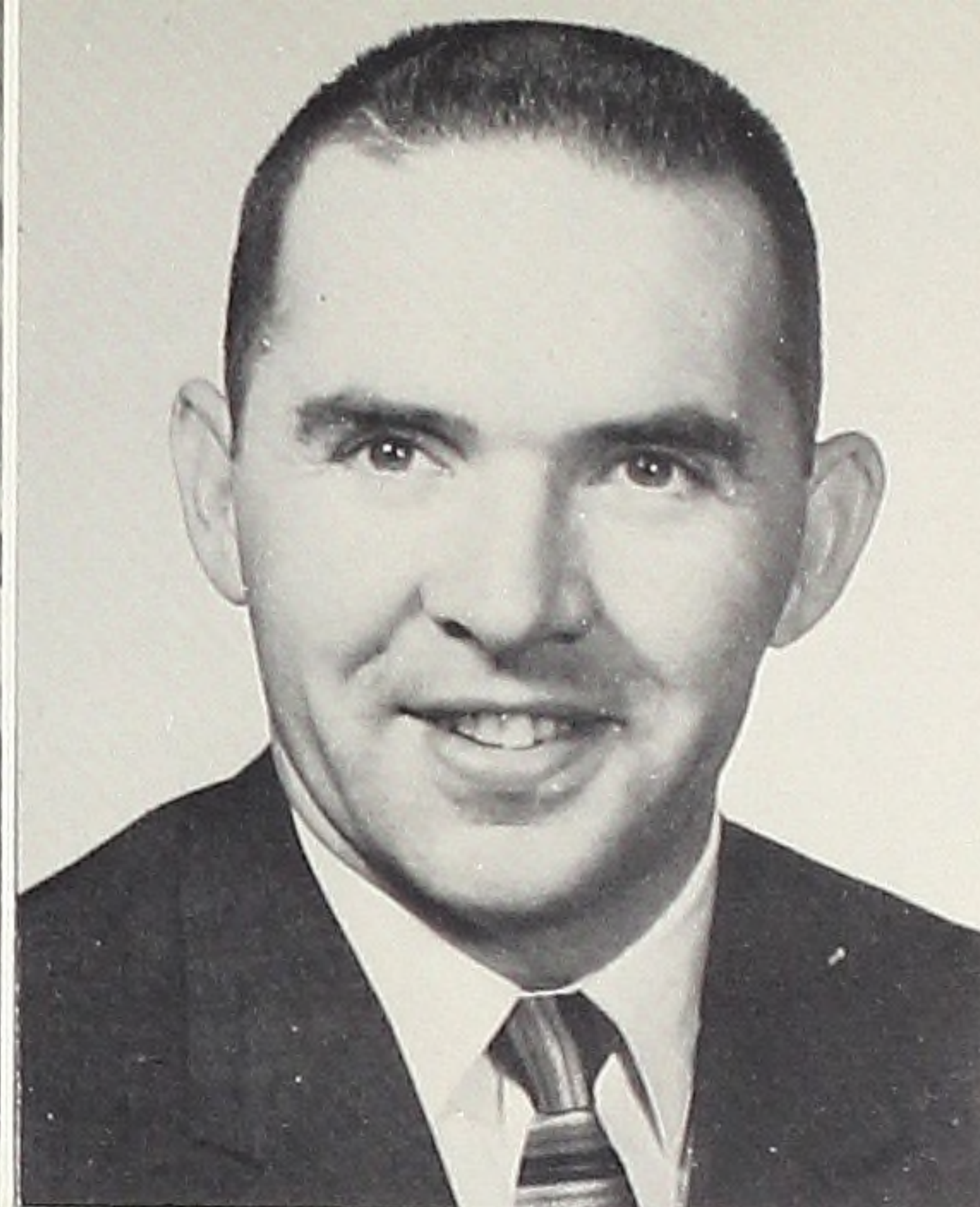
Although not directly in contact with the student body, the Board of Trustees controls a facet of our life, as it retains the highest authority in regard to the policies and growth of Spring Arbor College.

We wish to join with the Board in paying tribute to this great man of God for his Christian witness and his life of service.







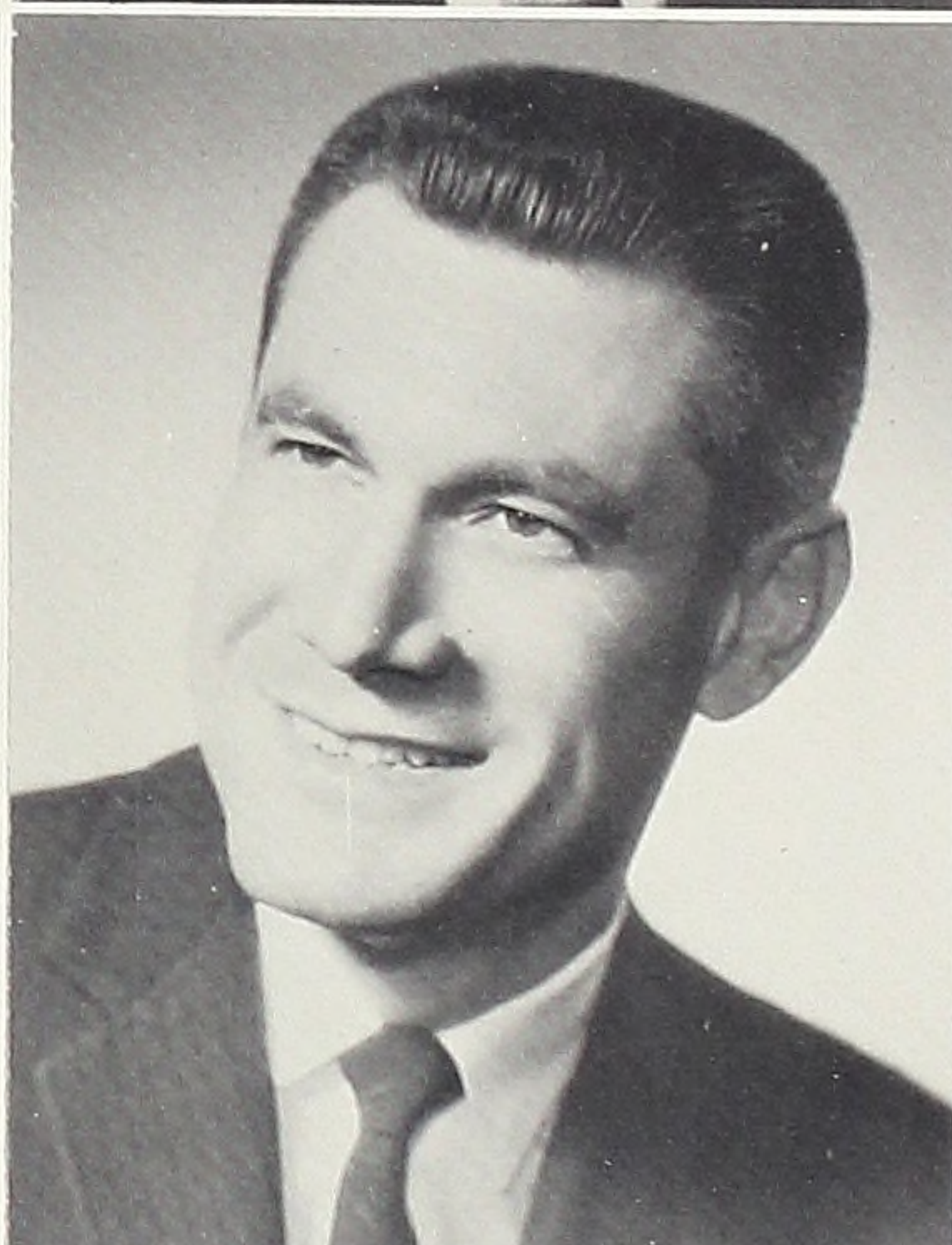
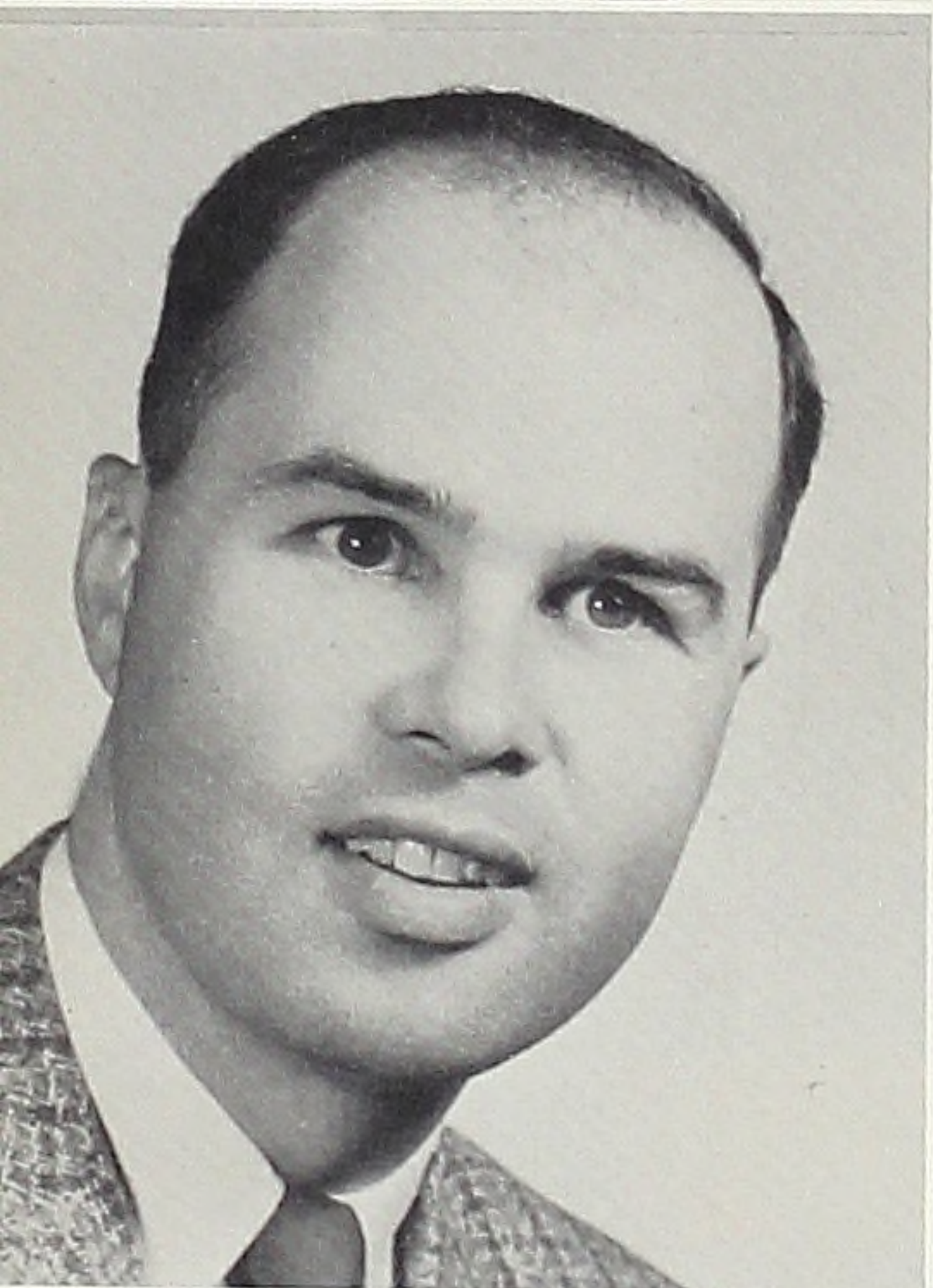

Besides canvassing in Benton Harbor and elsewhere, the club sent a carload of young people to Rice Creek each Sunday to work in the Sunday School.

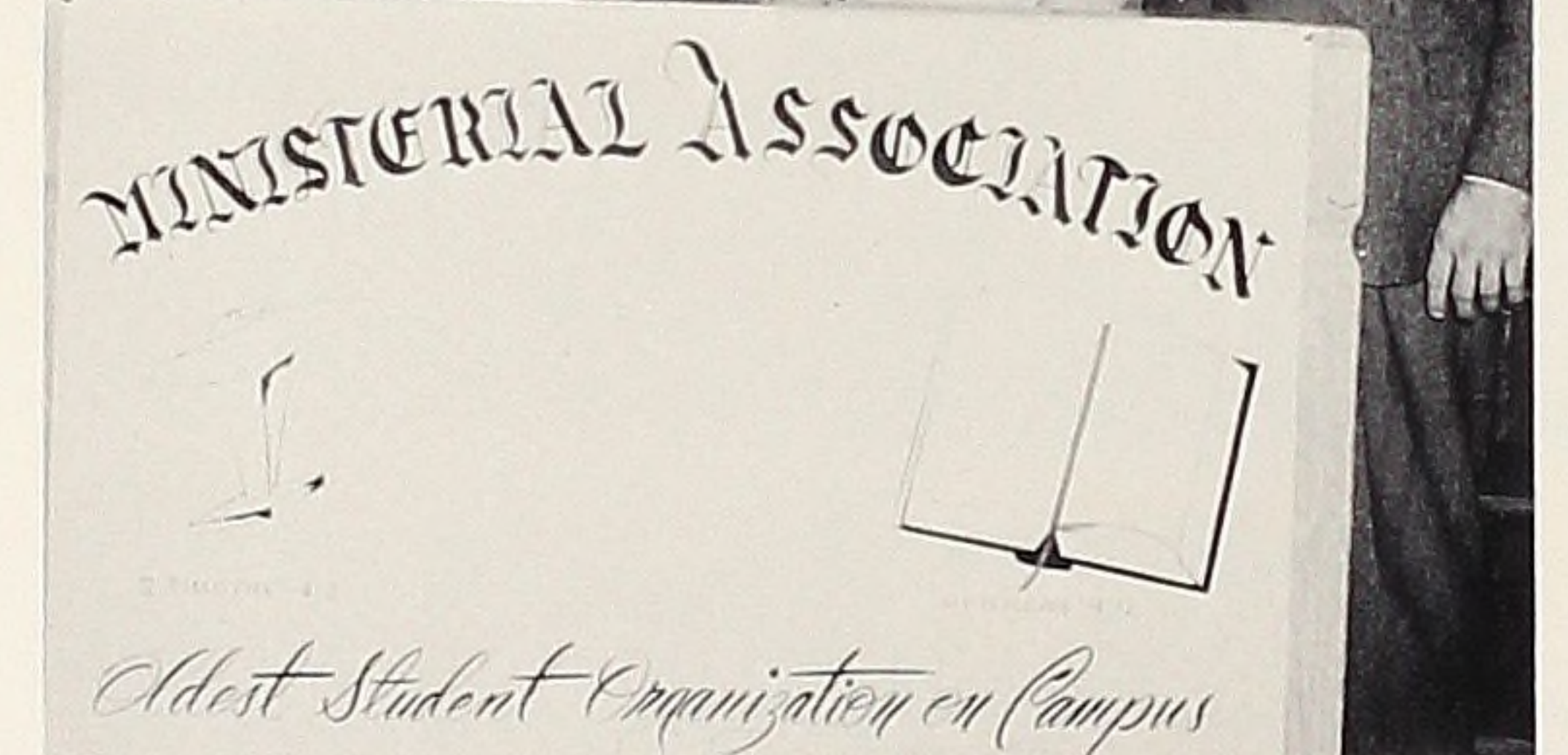

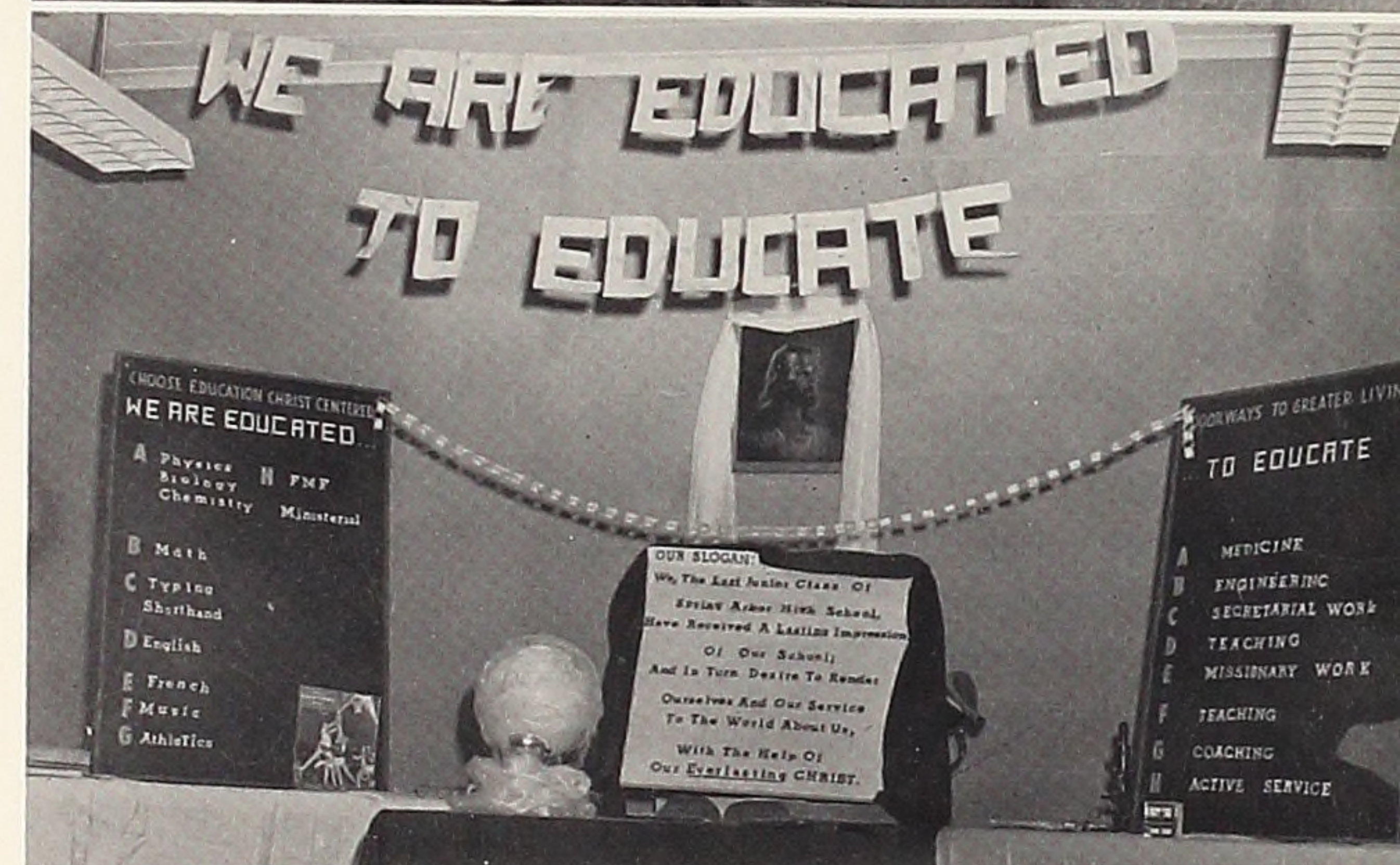
Their weekly prayer meetings were a blessing to each class member and were a help in keeping the spiritual fires glowing on campus.

For these and many other achievements in their high school years, we salute the last senior class and wish them success, happiness, and God's best for their lives.

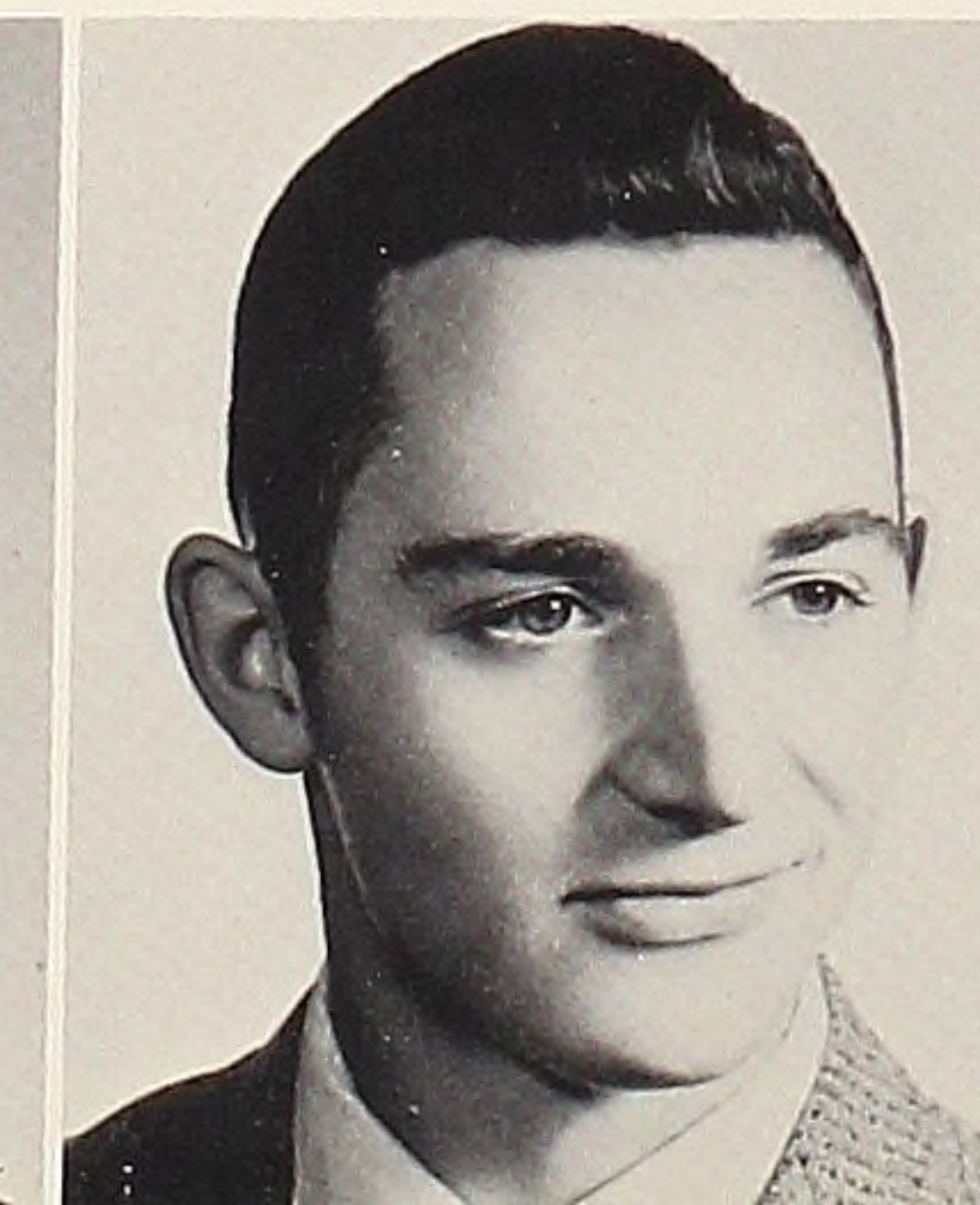
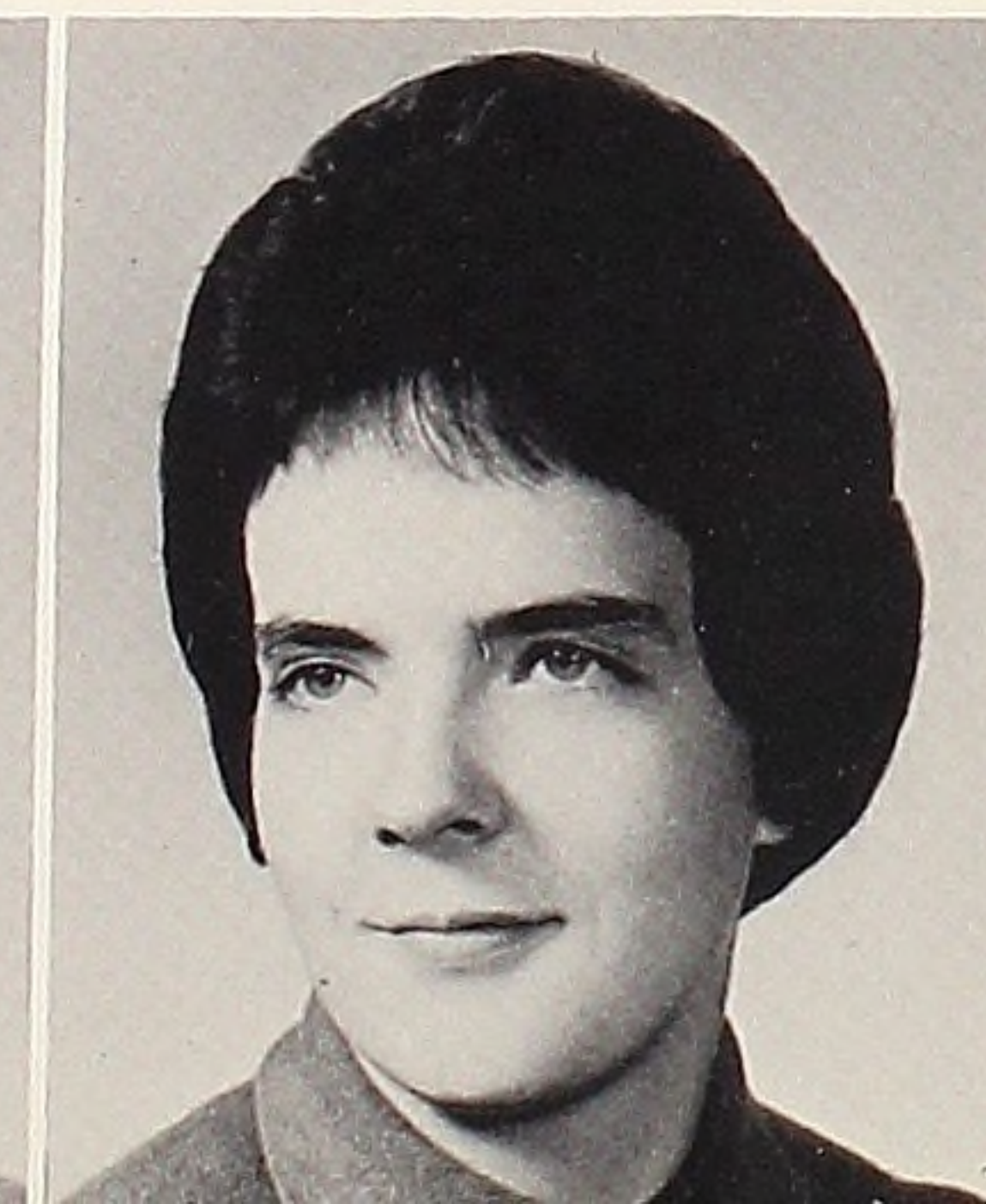
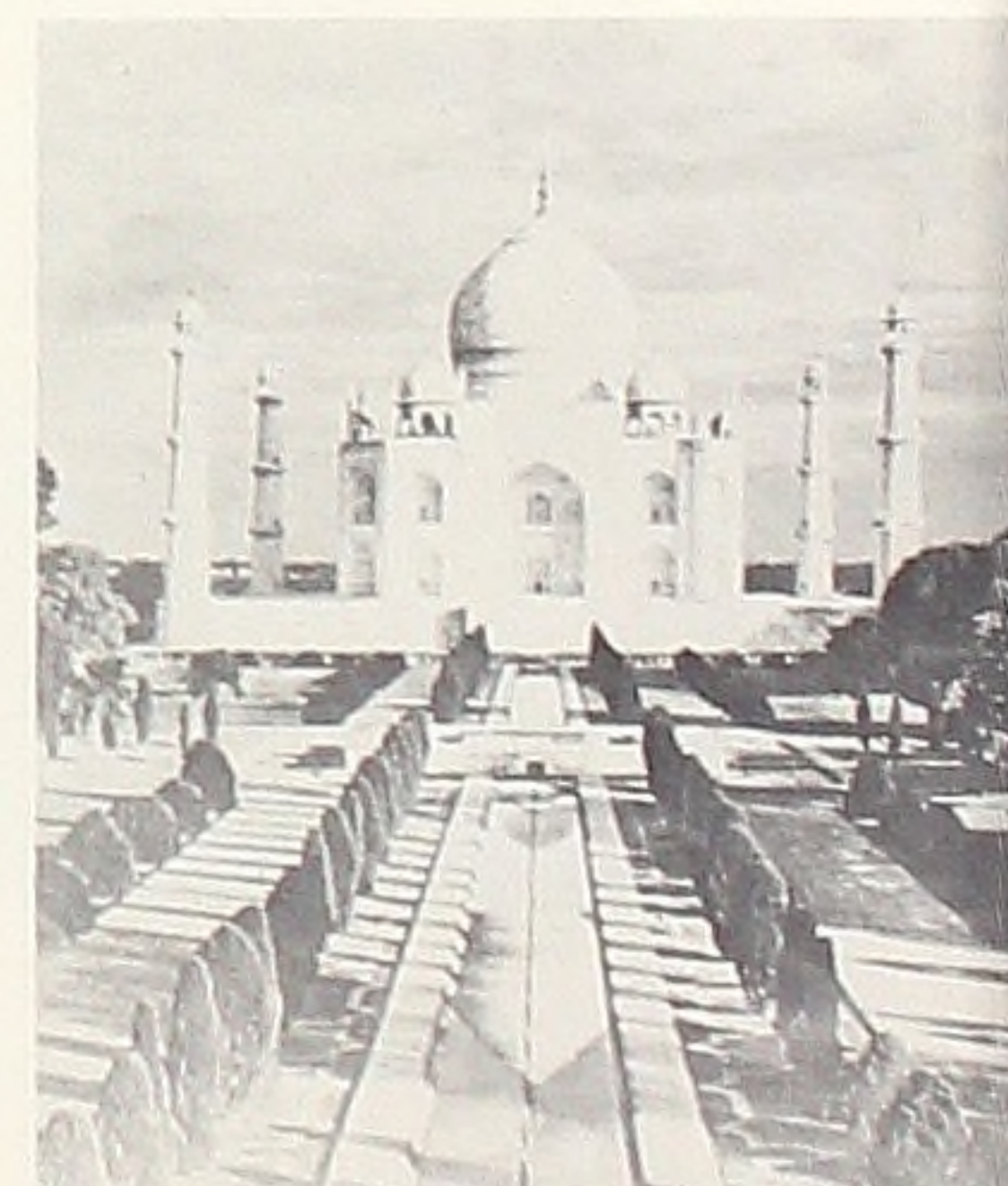

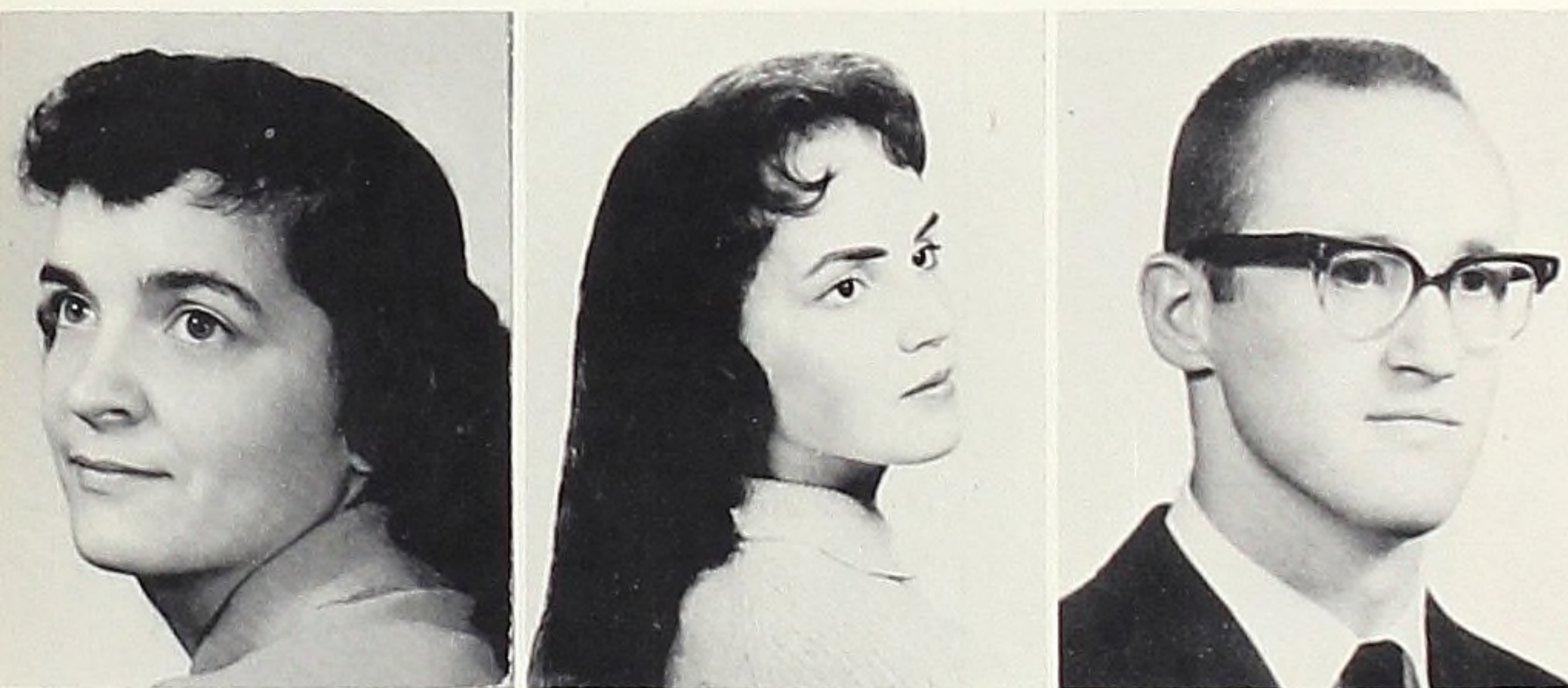
## new faces, new officers for second semester

The second semester brought with it many changes. As usual there were some students who didn't return; but there were also many new students who came to the campus at the beginning of the semester.

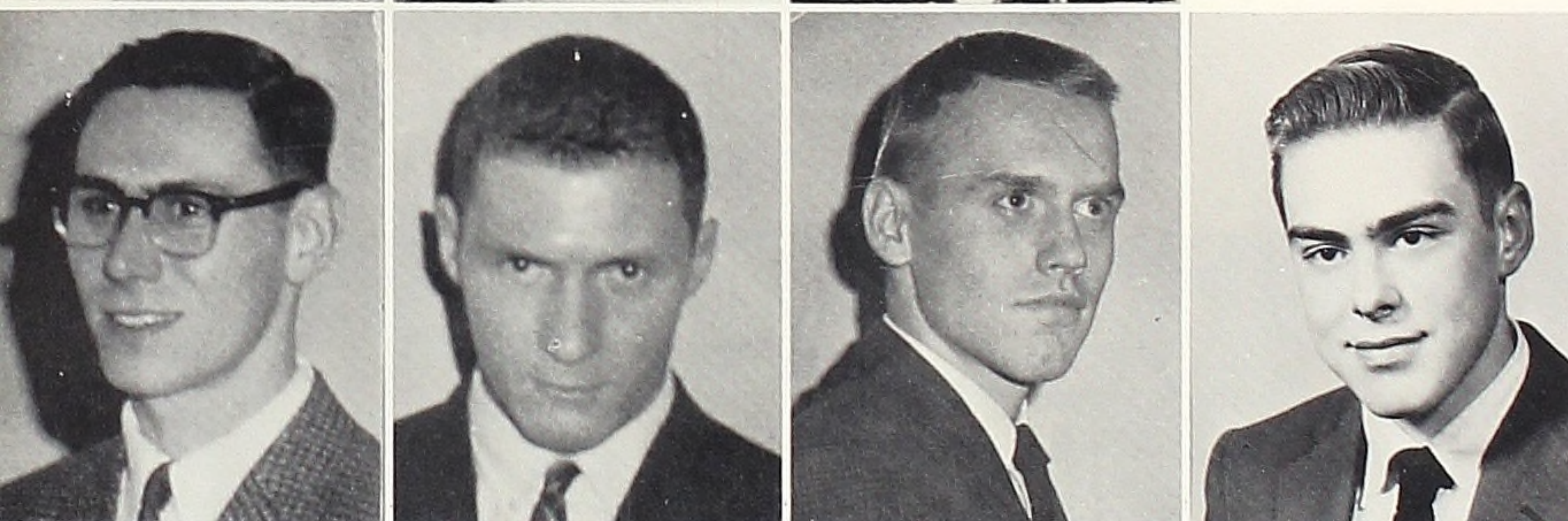
