
Local Church Holds Missionary Convention

The Spring Arbor Free Methodist Church will be holding a missionary convention with the theme, 'That the World May Know," during the week of November 15. Featured speakers at this convention will be Doolittle Raider, Jacob DeShazer, and Dr. C. I. Armstrong, World Missionary Statesman, Mr. DeShazer will be speaking from Sunday to Thursday, and Dr. Armstrong from Thursday to Sunday.

Jacob DeShazer was one of the Doolittle Raiders who bombed Tokyo in World War II. After being forced down over Japanese-infested China, he was condemned to death, but the sentence was later suspended by Emperor Hirohito.

While in prison, he was converted, and after the war he returned to preach the Gospel to his former enemies. Today Jake DeShazer is the best-loved missionary in Japan.

Other missionaries to be featured at the convention are Donald Cryder from Transvaal, Africa, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Dickinson from Portuguese East Africa, Mr. and Mrs. Lavern Snyder from Japan, and Rachael Smiley from the Dominican Republic.

Homecoming Weekend Focuses On Theme "New Horizons"

Spring Arbor College is looking at new horizons; although some are in the distance, yet others can be seen quite clearly. This 1964 Homecoming Weekend will focus attention on the theme "New Horizons". Curiosity and excitement have already been evidenced as the four classes prepare their displays. Mr. Marvin Moran, who is directing the Homecoming activities, has an-nounced the cash prizes to be awarded in various areas.

For the class which has the best display, \$25 will be given; the runner-up class will receive \$15. For the respective residence halls two cash prizes of \$15 and \$10 will be offered to those carrying out the Homecoming theme best. In each dorm a \$5 award will be given for the room which best represents the theme. Three opportunities are thus open for student participation.

Another way in which the students' voices may be heard is in the selection of the 1964 Homecoming Queen and her court. The attendants from the freshman through junior classes will be chosen and presented in chapel today; the top three senior candidates will sen also. Saturday night at Spring Arbor's fourth coronation, the Homecoming Queen will be announced.

A full schedule is awaiting for November 13-15. Friday evening at 8 p.m. the A Cappella and Vesper Choir members will present H.M.S. Pinafore.

He will also continue his stay throughout the week's Missionary Convention.

This week-end's activities will unite alumni, present students, and prospective students with special emphasis for each. The participation of every student predicts certain success and enjoyment.


Experience confirms that it is those whom we love the best that we criticize the most. Likewise, we make criticisms and complaints about those things with which we are most familiar and best acquainted. Since we have full knowledge of these areas, we therefore realize all the faults present. Human nature then sorts out the bad for derogatory remarks and accepts the good without praise as merely the appropriate.

We at Spring Arbor are guilty of following these tendencies. Since our contact with it is three times each day, twenty-one times each week, the food receives a major portion of these remarks. Teachers similarly may fall under critical discussion. As a result of the close living situations, each student on campus also gets his share of critical observation. Finally, activities specially planned or of informal types can be slowly torn to shreds. The problem is that almost all of these are accomplished without intention of malice.

Complaining is a result of thoughtlessness. Too often the effect that words can produce is simply not realized before the offending words "just pop out." When someone else begins the conversation in a critical trend, others who have not previously had any intention to so speak find themselves nevertheless carried along in the conversation. Extreme criticism can also be attributed to selfishness—wishing everything to be pleasing to self and complaining about anything's so failing.

As Homecoming approaches, let's concentrate on guarding our thoughts and words. Alumni will be interested in the advances Spring Arbor has made, while prospective students need encouragement to make Spring Arbor their choice.

Nothing is accomplished from unpurposeful criticism; everything is to be gained from positive thinking and speaking.



traveled to Ann Arbor and encountered a tough University of Michigan squad on Saturday, October 24, at the U. of M. golf course. SA placed three men in the top five, but it was not enough as the Wolverines edged the Spring Arbor Harriers 26-29.

Brian Kelly from U. of M. placed first in the dual meet with a fine time of 20:11 for the four-mile course. Barry May, of SA, led throughout most of the race but had to settle for second place as Kelly kicked past him with two hundred yards remaining in the race May's time was 20:16. Richard Knapp was the next man in for SA as he placed fourth with a time of 20:51. Jerry Smith followed close behind with a time of 20:45, placing fifth. The next Bluejay runner to cross the finish line was Mike Dapprich as he placed eighth with a time of 22:11. The fifth man in for the SA Harriers was Gary Baird with a time of 22:31 to place tenth in the meet. Bill Robson placed eleventh with a time of 22:50. U. of M. displayed fine team balance as they placed first, third, sixth, seventh, and ninth for their total of 26 points.

The Blue Jays placed three men in the top ten to place second among four teams in the second annual Olivet Invitational Cross Country Meet held on Tuesday, October 27 in Olivet, Michigan.

Barry May was the first man across the finish line for the Spring Arbor Harriers with a time of 22:26 to break the old course record of 23:07 held by Tony Mifsud, a former SA runner. May placed first among the 27 runners competing as he was sixteen seconds ahead of the second place finisher over the 4 and 3-8 mile course. He was followed across the line by Jerry Smith as he toured the course in 23:03 to place fourth. The next man to hit the tape for SA was Richard Knapp, who placed fifth with a

Varsity Basketball To Face Alumni

The Spring Arbor College varsity basketball team under the direction of head coach, Mr. Henry Burbridge, and assistant coach, Mr. Darrell Dunckel, will open the 1964-65 season with the Alumni, Saturday, November 14. The varsity began practice the first week in October and has been working hard ever since the opening day.

Emphasis this year will be placed on developing a tough defense combined with getting the opponents to play our type or our style of ball game. The team will concentrate on a pressing defense which they hope will force the opponents into making mistakes, such as bad passes, fumbles, and poor shooting. The team will vary their defense by sometimes throwing a full court press and alternating this with a

time of 23:10. Mike Dapprich was next in for the SA Harriers with a time of 24:31 to place twelfth. The fifth man to cross the finish line for SA was Gary Baird with a time of 24:55. Bill Robson placed twenty-second with a time of 26:01, and Dale Heimberger placed twenty-seventh.

Hillsdale College continued their undefeated record this season by winning the invitational with 32 points, as they placed five men in the top ten. Following Hillsdale in order of finish were Spring Arbor with 39 points, Aquinas College 57, and the host team Olivet College with a total of 102.

The SA Harriers placed three men in the top four, but it was not enough as Hillsdale College displayed fine team balance in defeating SAC 28-31 in a dual meet. The cross country meet was held at Ella Sharp Park before a fine contingent of Spring Arbor rooters.

Barry May continued his fine running by again taking first with a time of 20:43 over the four mile course. This was May's best time over the Spring Arbor course as he beat Hillsdale's number one man, Doug Hansen, for the second time this season, the first being at the Olivet Invitational. Hansen placed second in the Spring Arbor meet with a time of 21:07 to lead his team to victory. Jerry Smith of SA placed third in the meet as he was only eight seconds away from beating Hansen.

Spring Arbor's next cross country meet will be at Ella Sharp tomorrow when they host the NAIA State Cross Country Meet.

The Alumni teams will be organized by the SAC/Sons a group of local members who are interested in promoting intercollegiate athletics at Spring Arbor College. The SAC/Sons have created enough interest on the part of the Alumni that there will be two organized games during Homecoming night. In the first game the Alumni who graduated before 1957 will be playing one another, with the graduates from the even numbered years playing the graduates from the odd numbered years. In the second game, the Alumni who have graduated since 1957 will be playing the Spring Arbor College varsity. Mr. Bob Delamarter will be coaching the Alumni in the game with the varsity. Also of interest, the Alumni will provide a cheerleading squad made up of six women cheering their team to victory.
