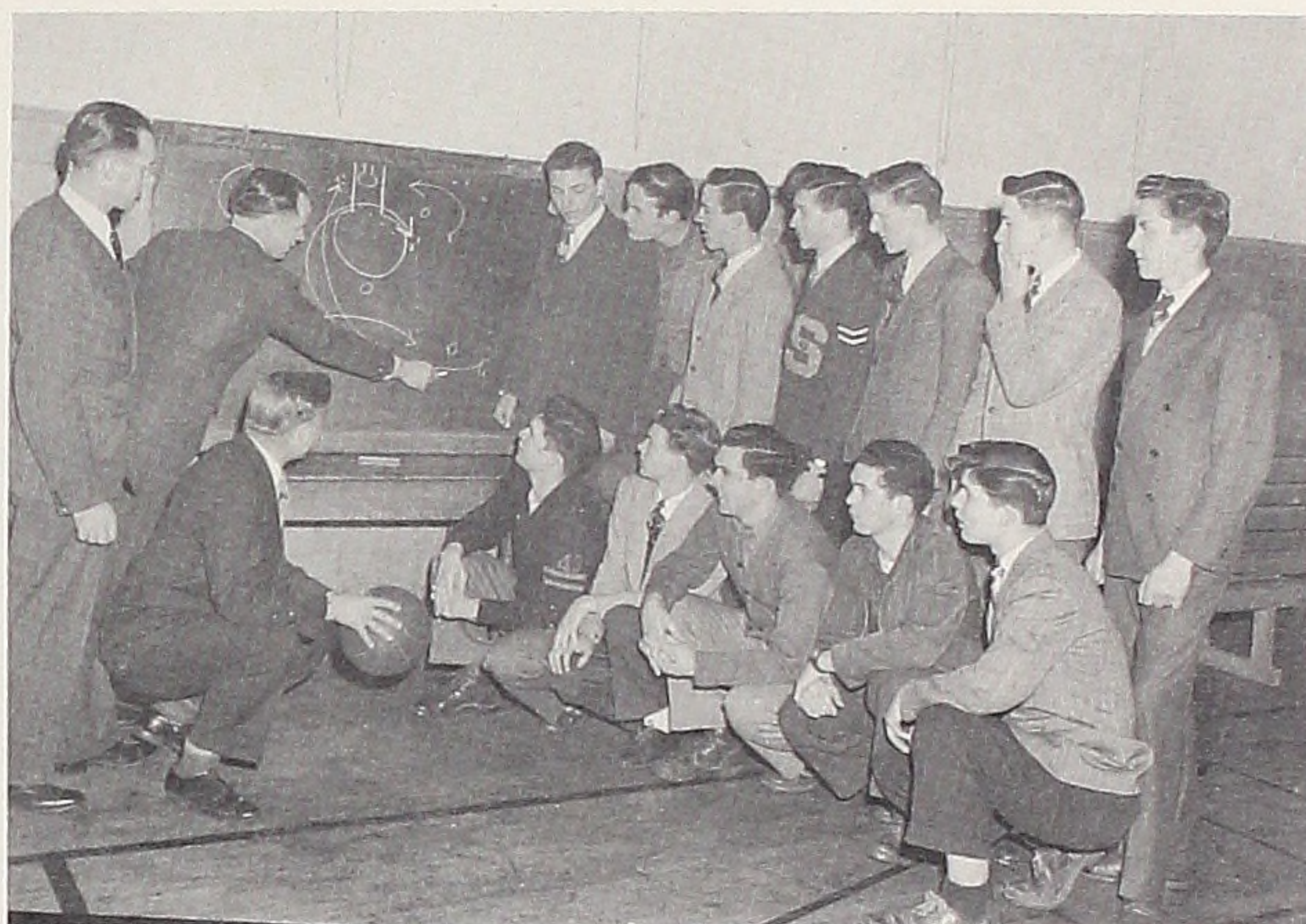
BASEBALL

The girls' varsity has been very active this year. Under the coaching of Mrs. McDonald, the girls proved stiff competition for the Alumni team and other outside teams.

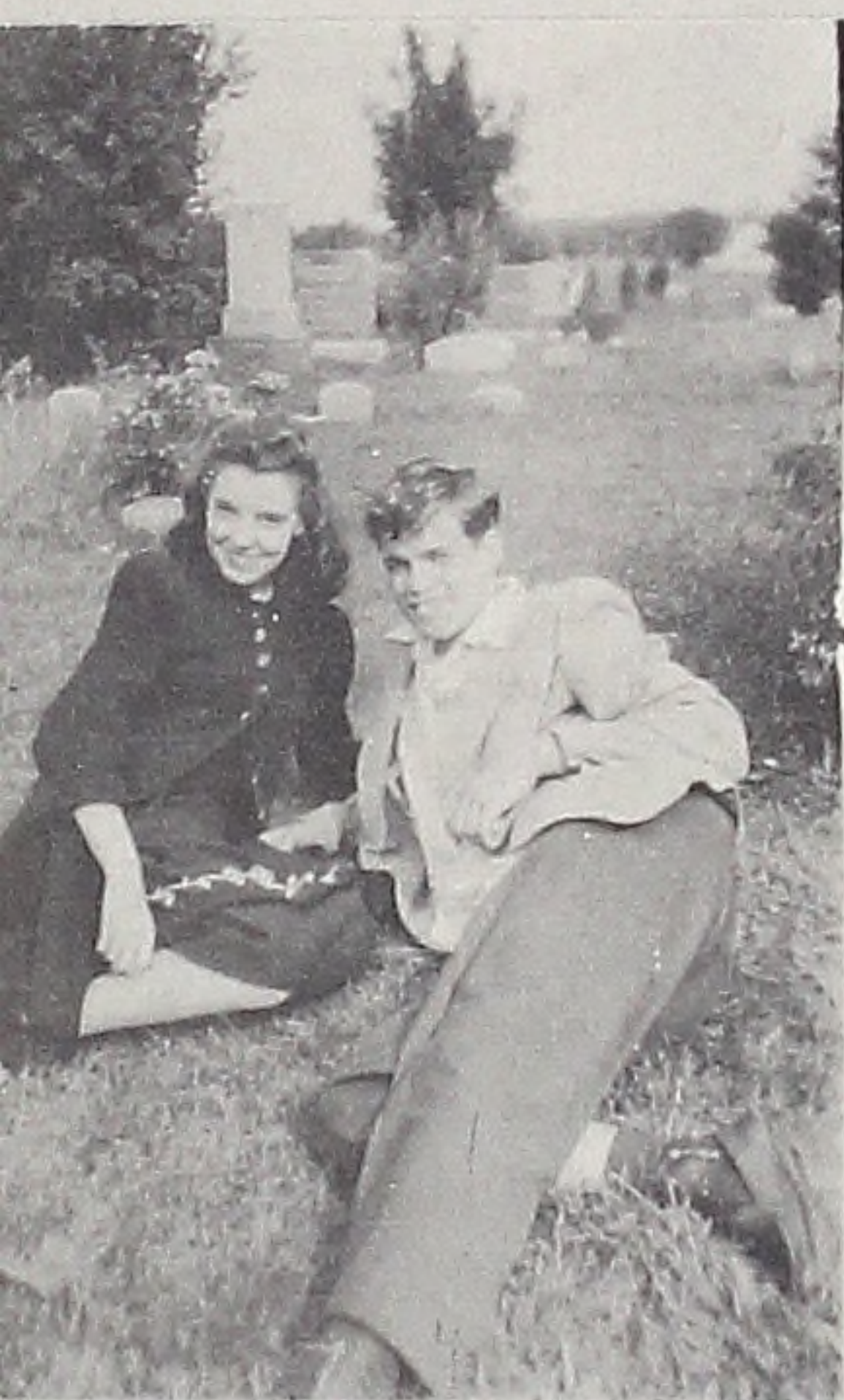
INTRAMURAL BASKETBALL
