College Sophomore Class History



This time, the banquet was held in our honor, and the Juniors made it a great and pleasant success.




Juniors

Sophomores


We Sophs have just caught our breath after reaching the first landing and are attempting the second flight of stairs leading us to our Senior days.


This year the A Cappella went on a ten day concert tour through southern Michigan and Ohio.


Chatterbox Club


High School Varsity Basketball



College Varsity Basketball



Track




High School Varsity
