





PRESENTATION




### ECHO


The high school freshmen put the whole school to shame with their zeal in selling "Echoes" during the contest this winter.

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






### MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION

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

#### SPANISH CLUB




Under the direction of Mr. Mulholland, a manual arts club was organized. During the year the club has collected tools for the use of its members.


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
### REDS
