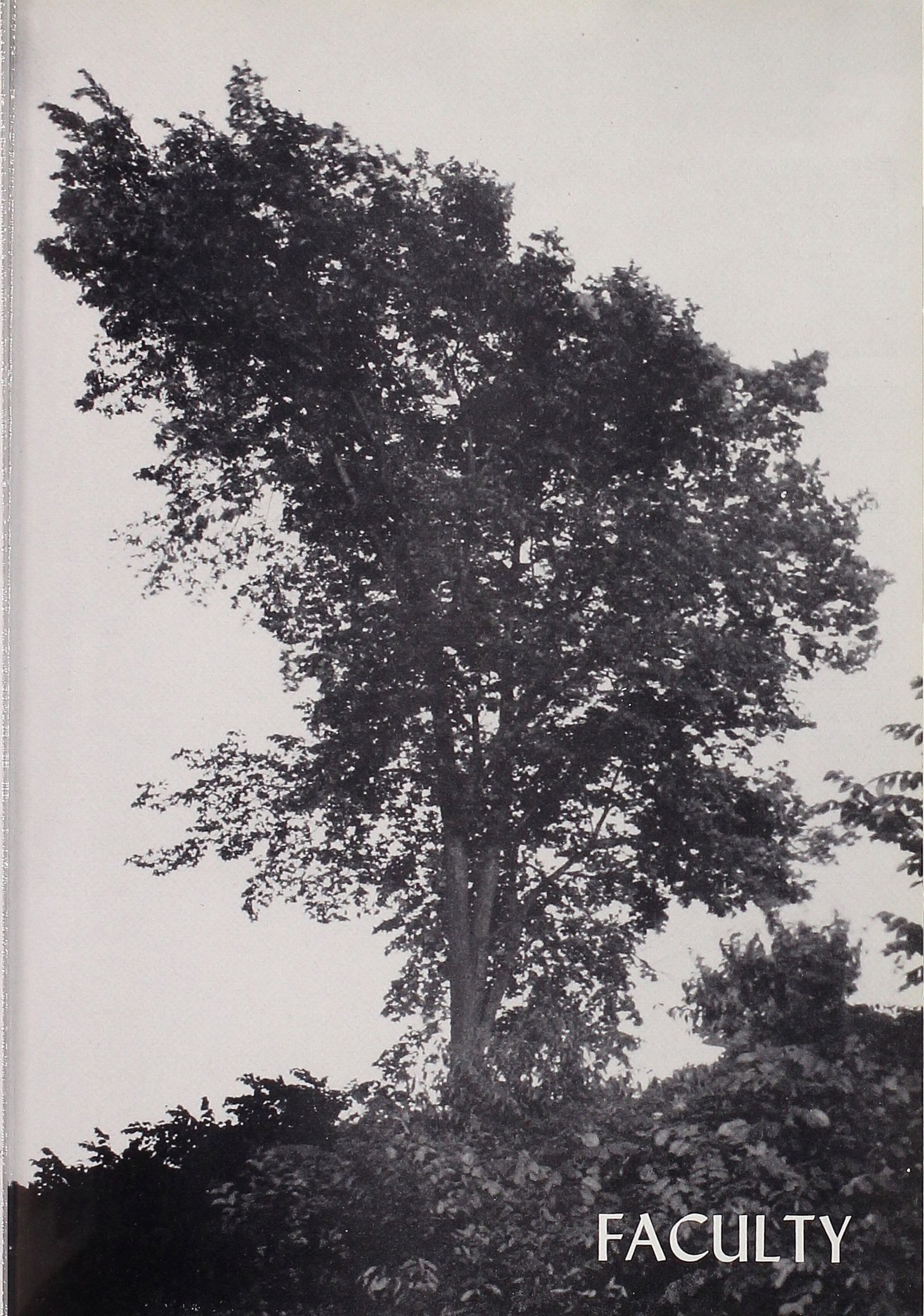
SENIOR CLASS PROPHECY
