
WILFRED JOHNSON

HIGH SCHOOL SOPHOMORES '40







Basketball takes co-operation and teamwork to produce a winning team. That is just what has happened in the Girls' Basketball tournament, both in 1939 and 1940.




Despite the fact that these teams won in an easy fashion, many close and interesting games were played on our gym floor in 1939-40.
