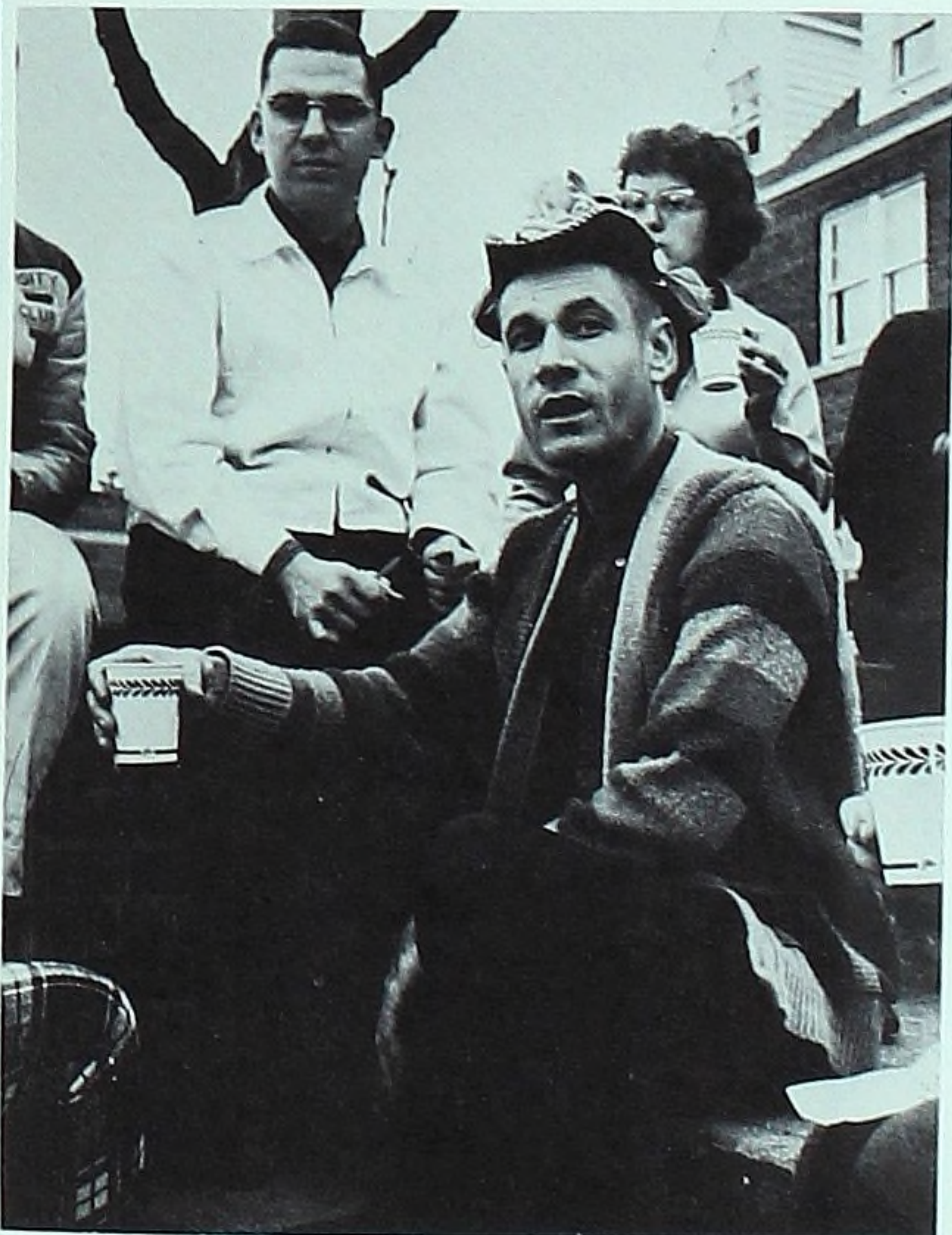


Dedicated Insights

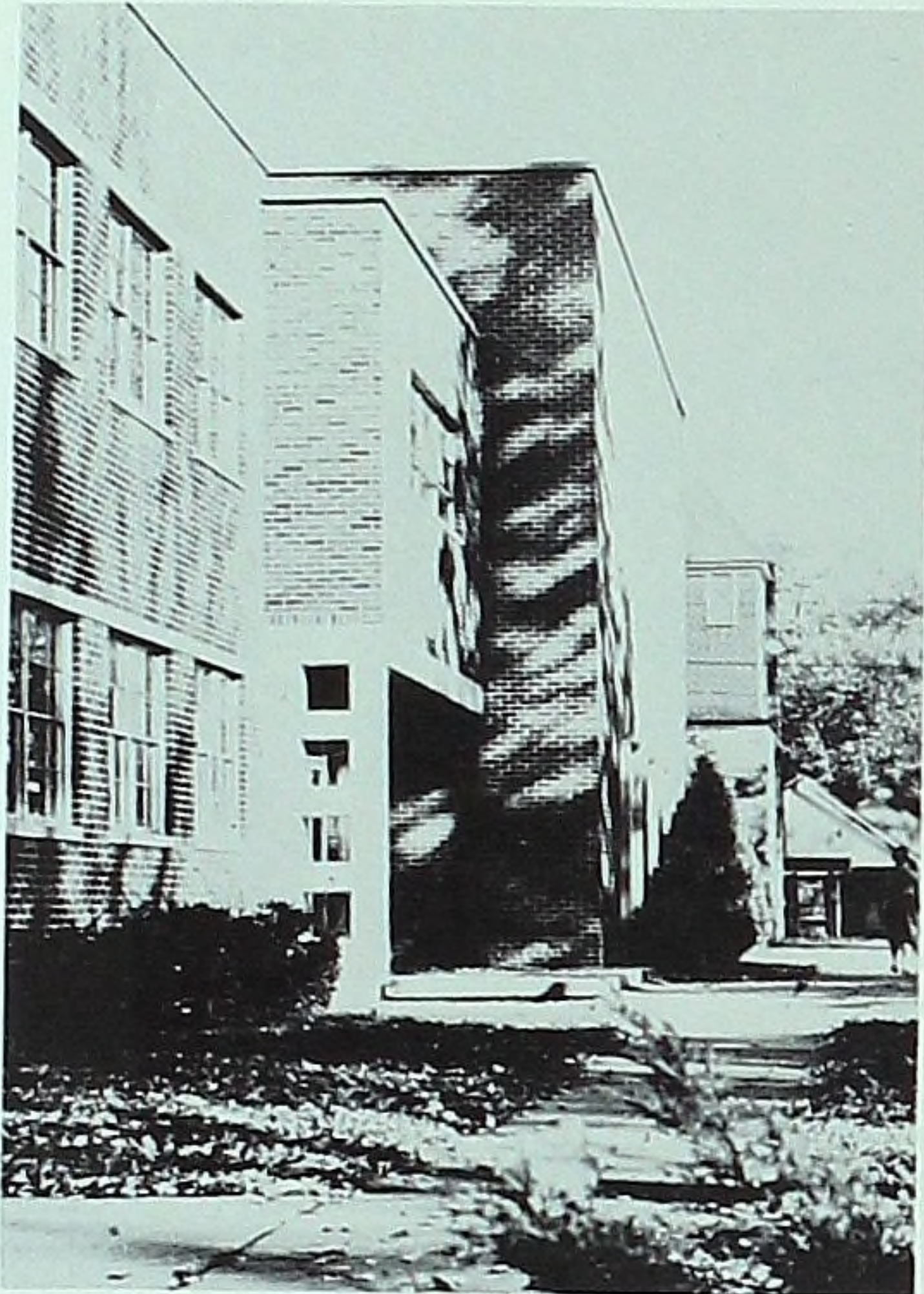

Because your insight and thoughtful perception are determining Spring Arbor's future, we dedicate the 1962 ECHO to you, Mr. Williams.

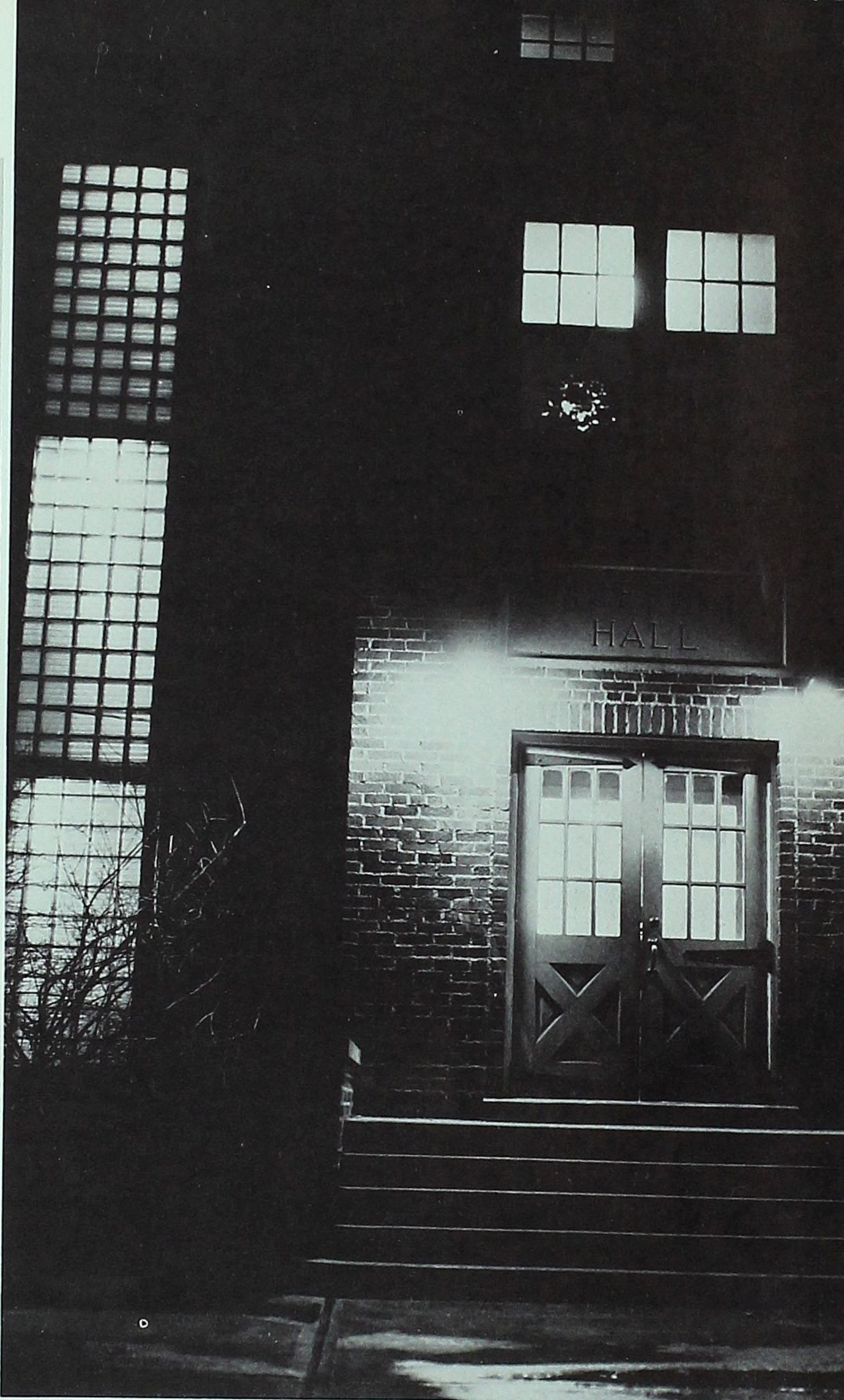

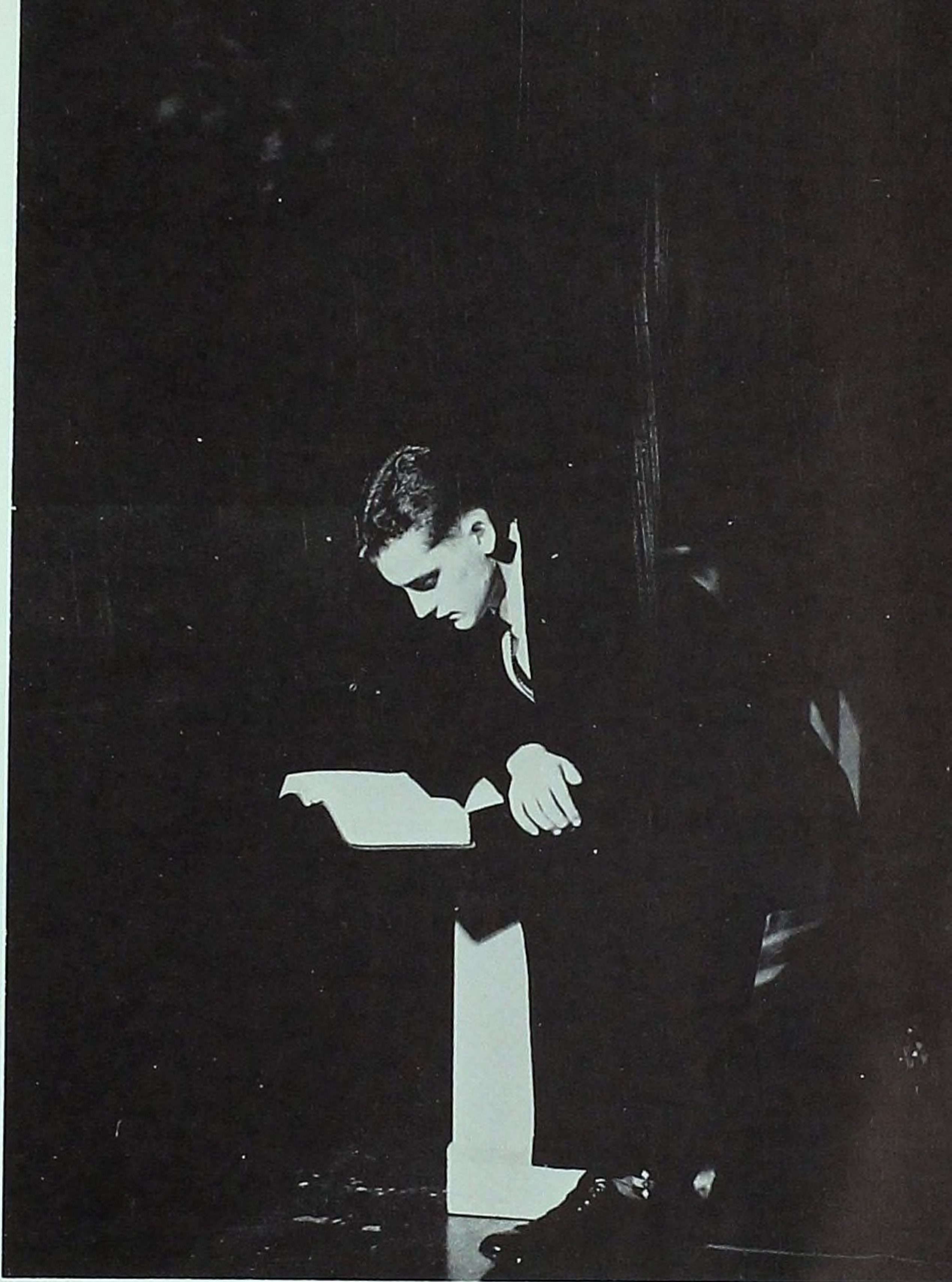
Insights Into Spring Arbor College

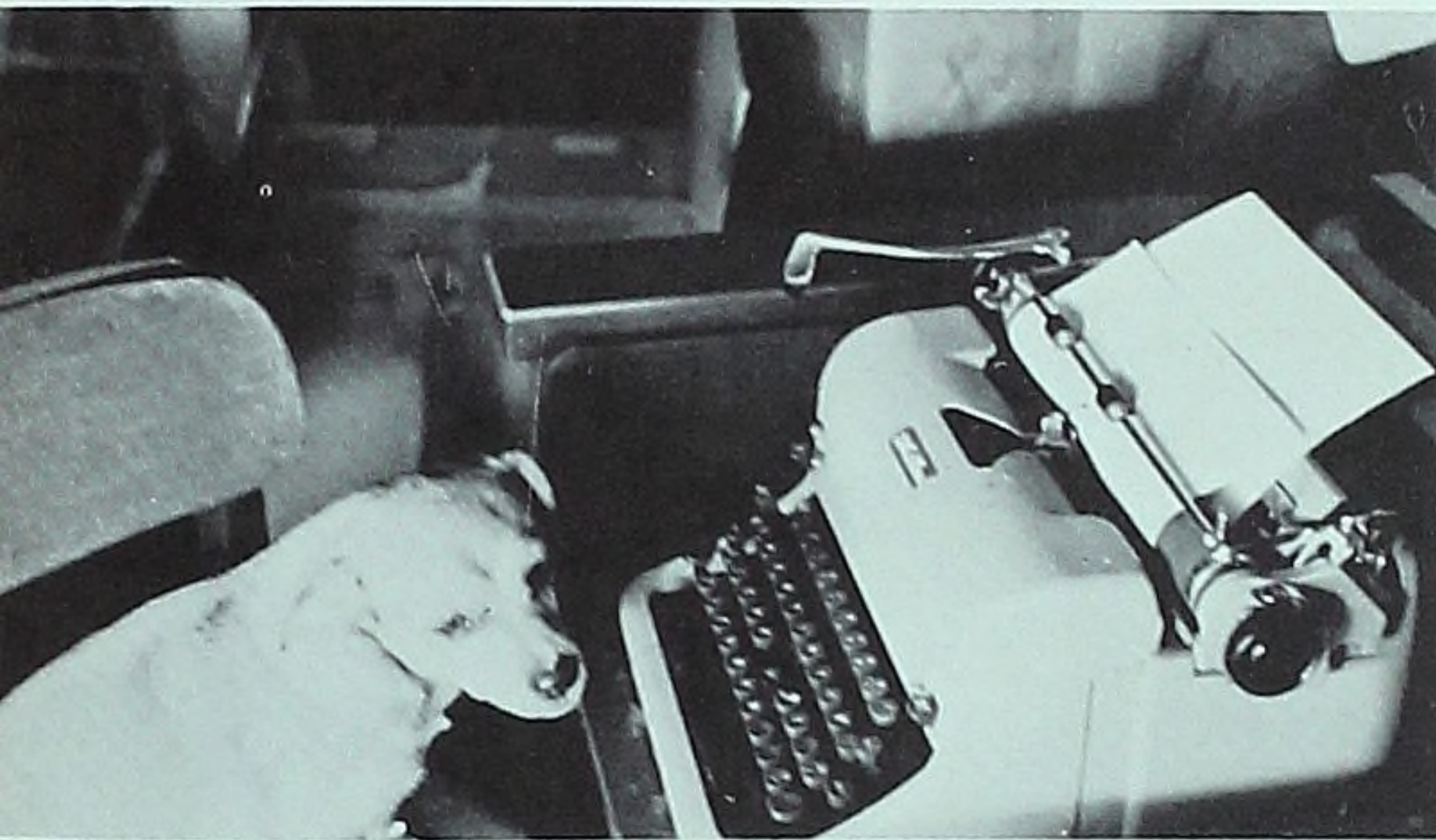

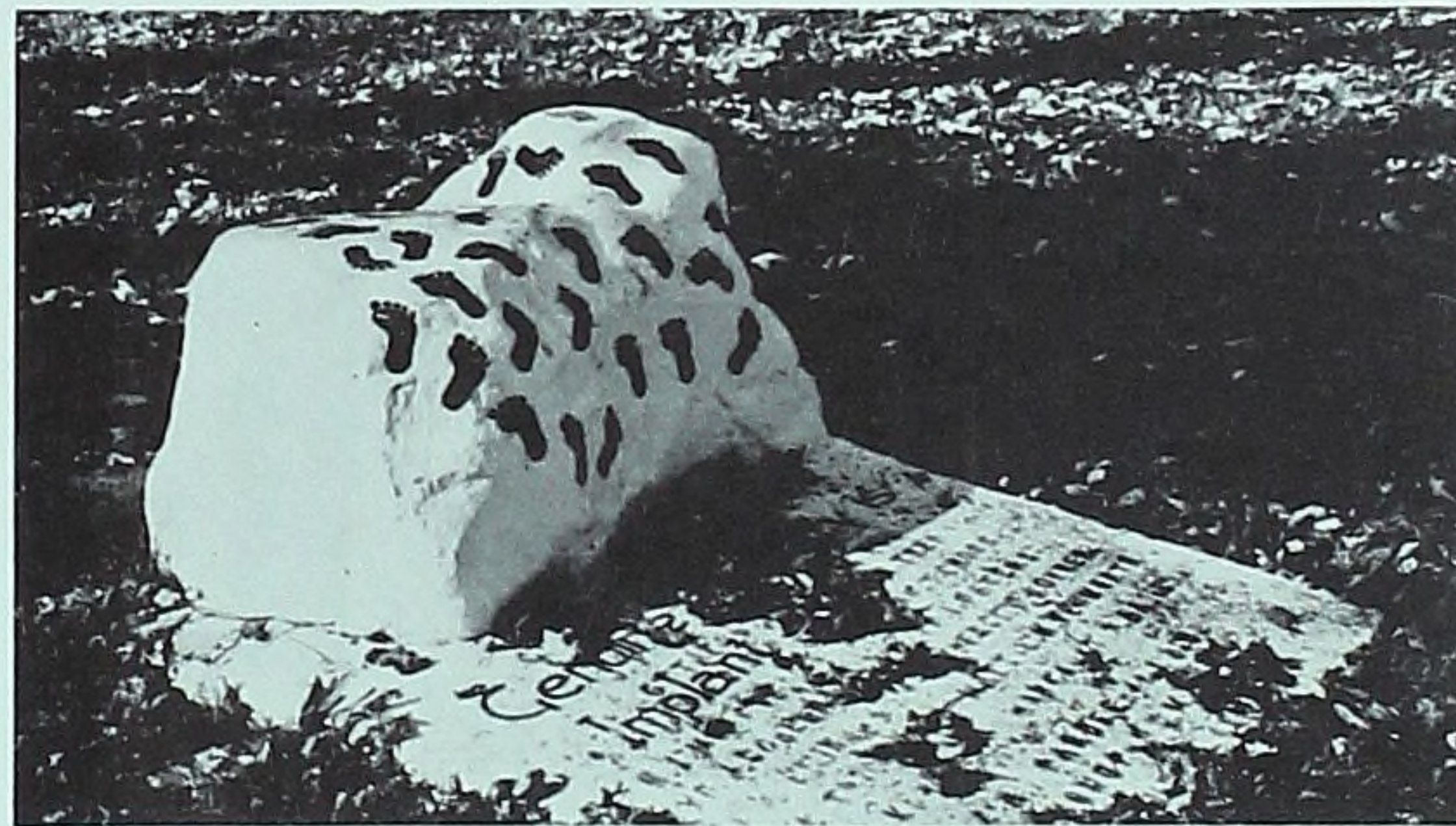


Familiar Insights

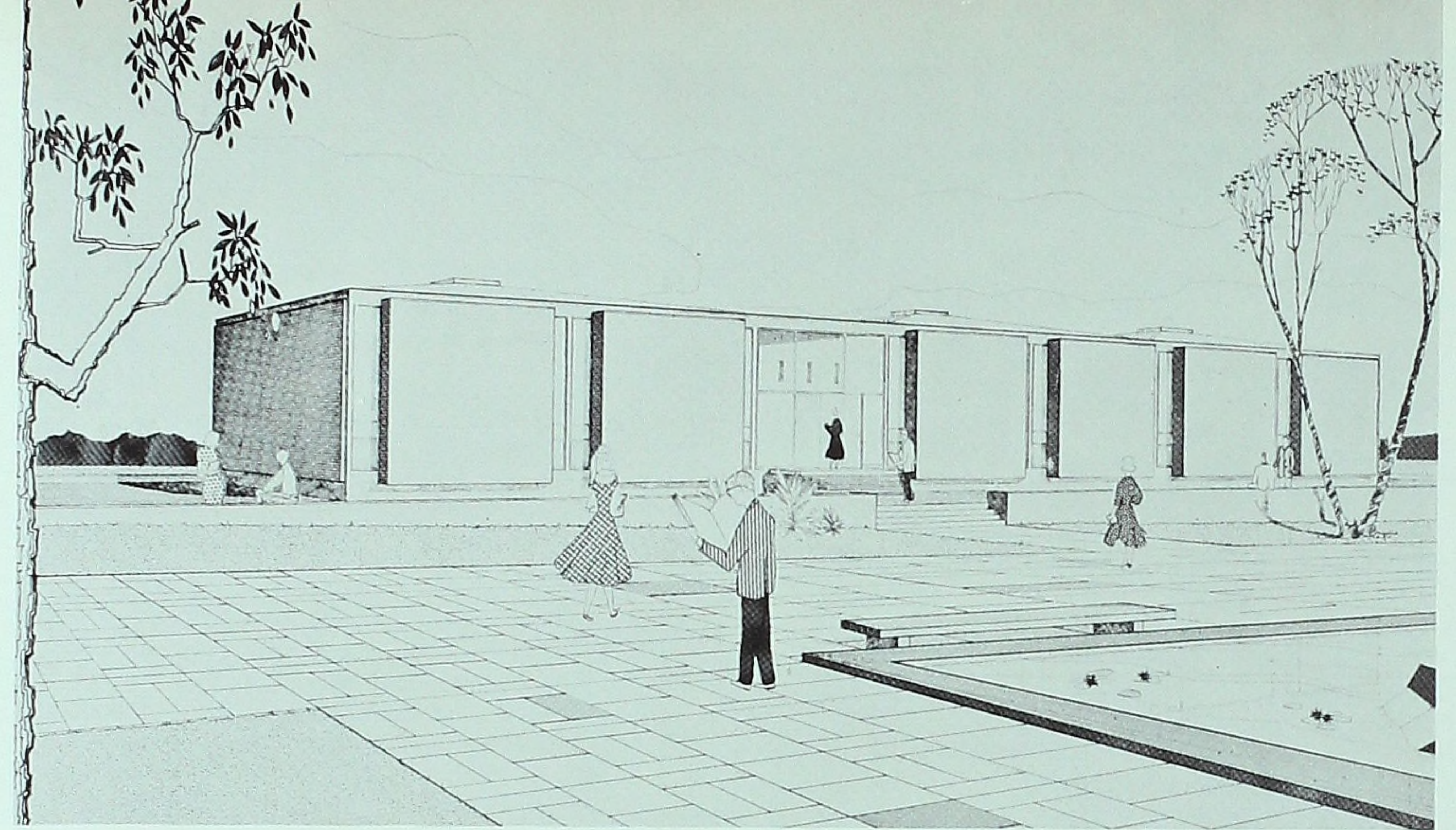

To see accomplished this extensive program of expansion calls for boldness in planning and promotion along with consecration to the divine mission of Christian education.



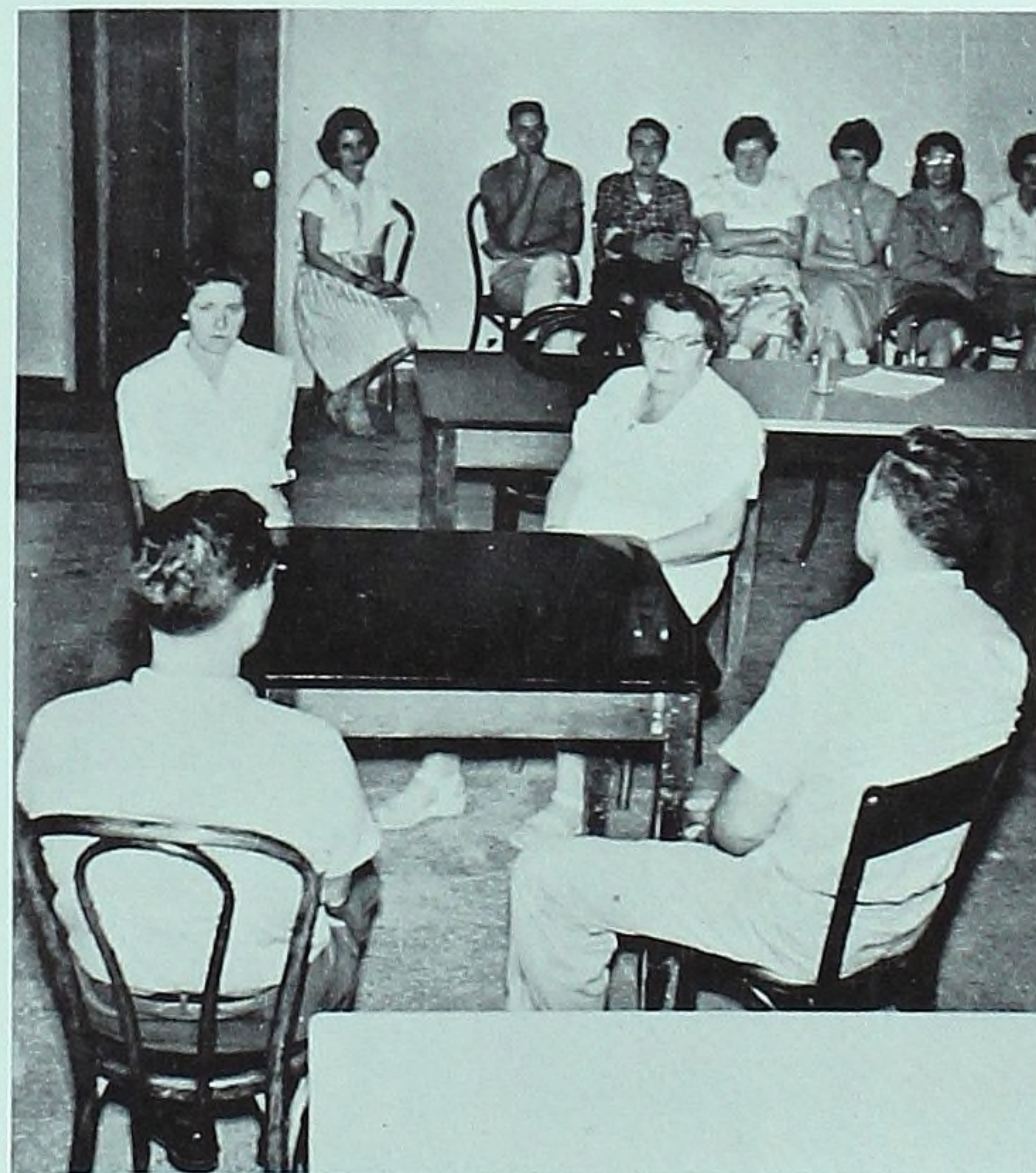

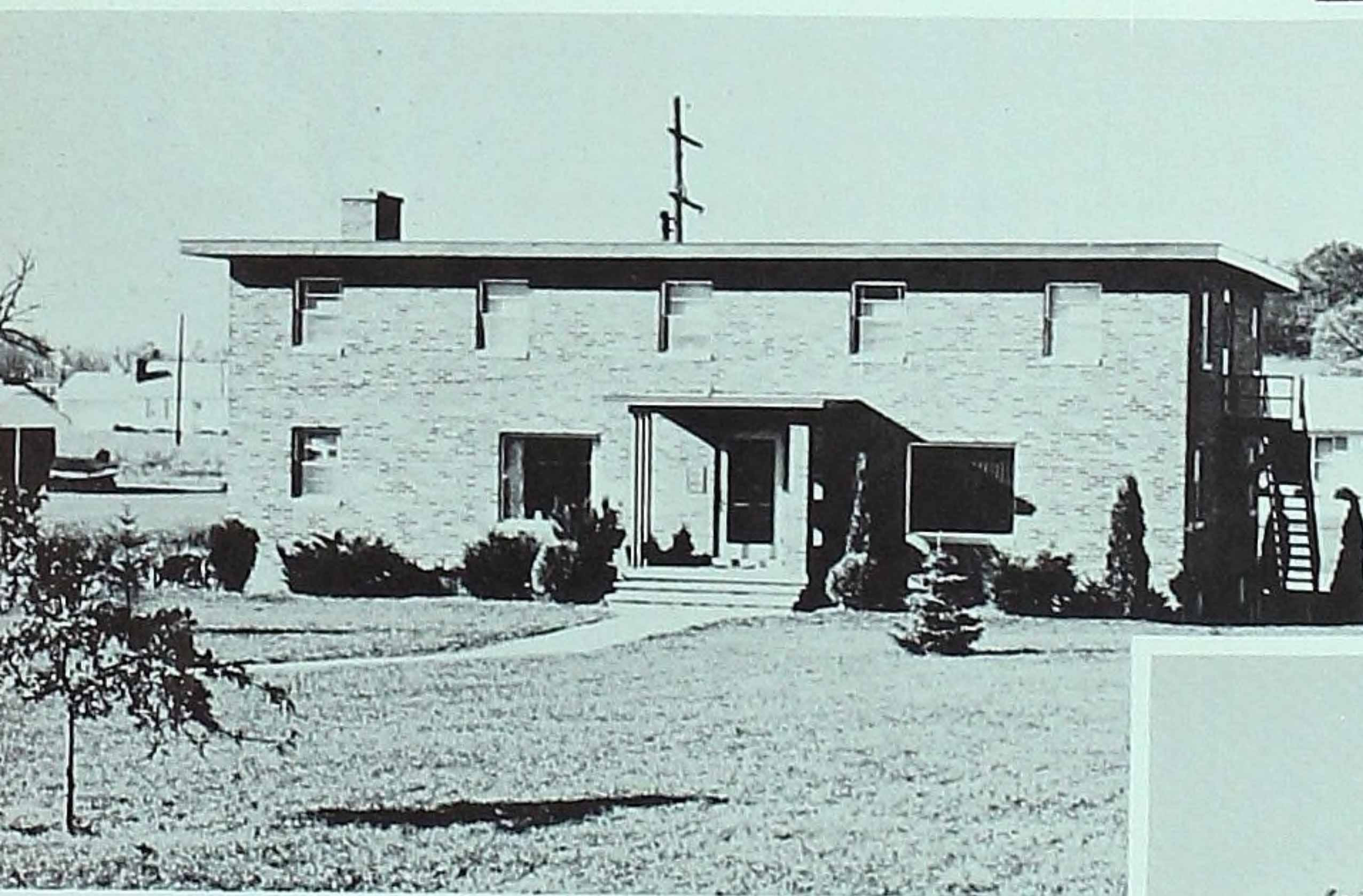

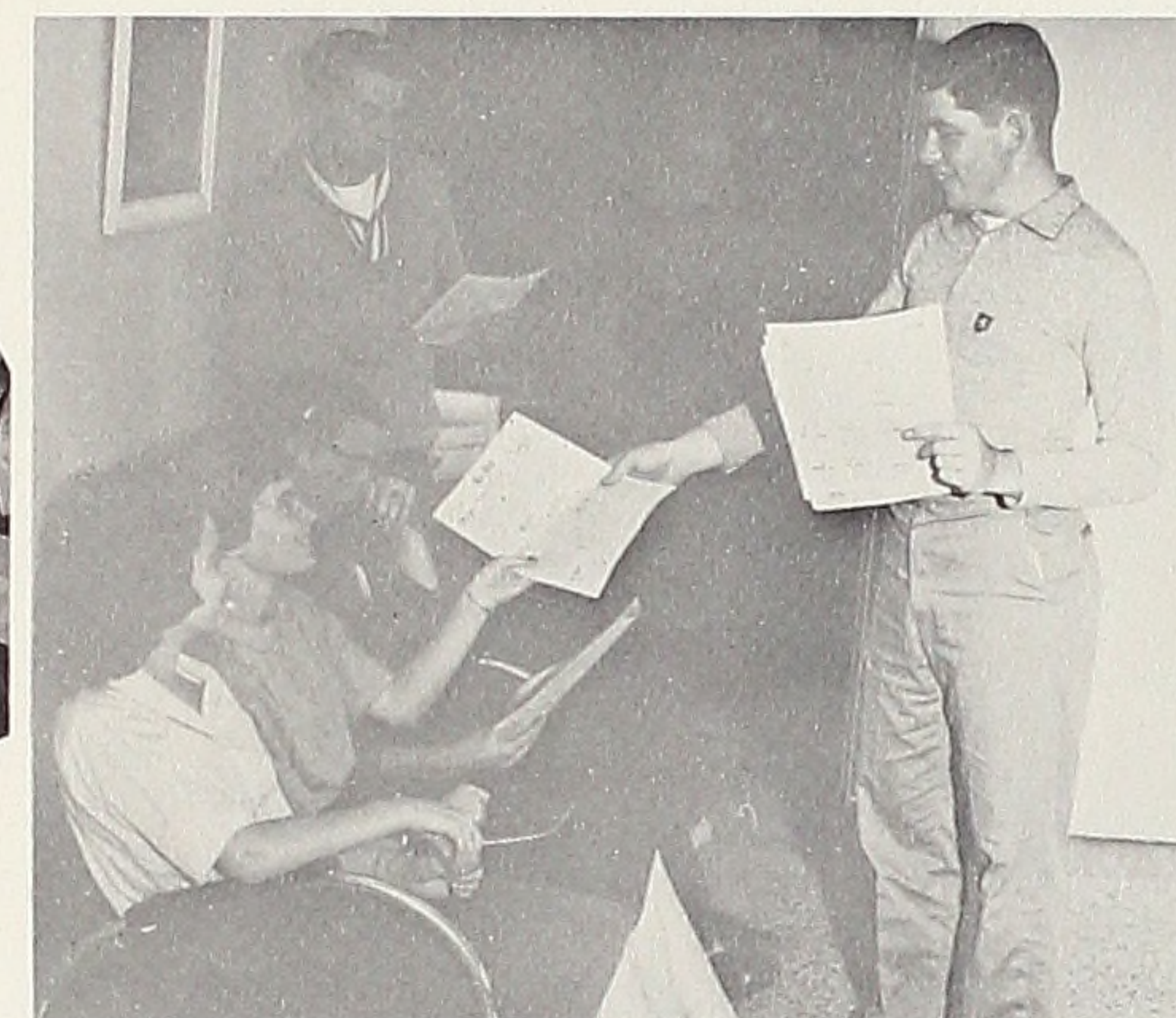
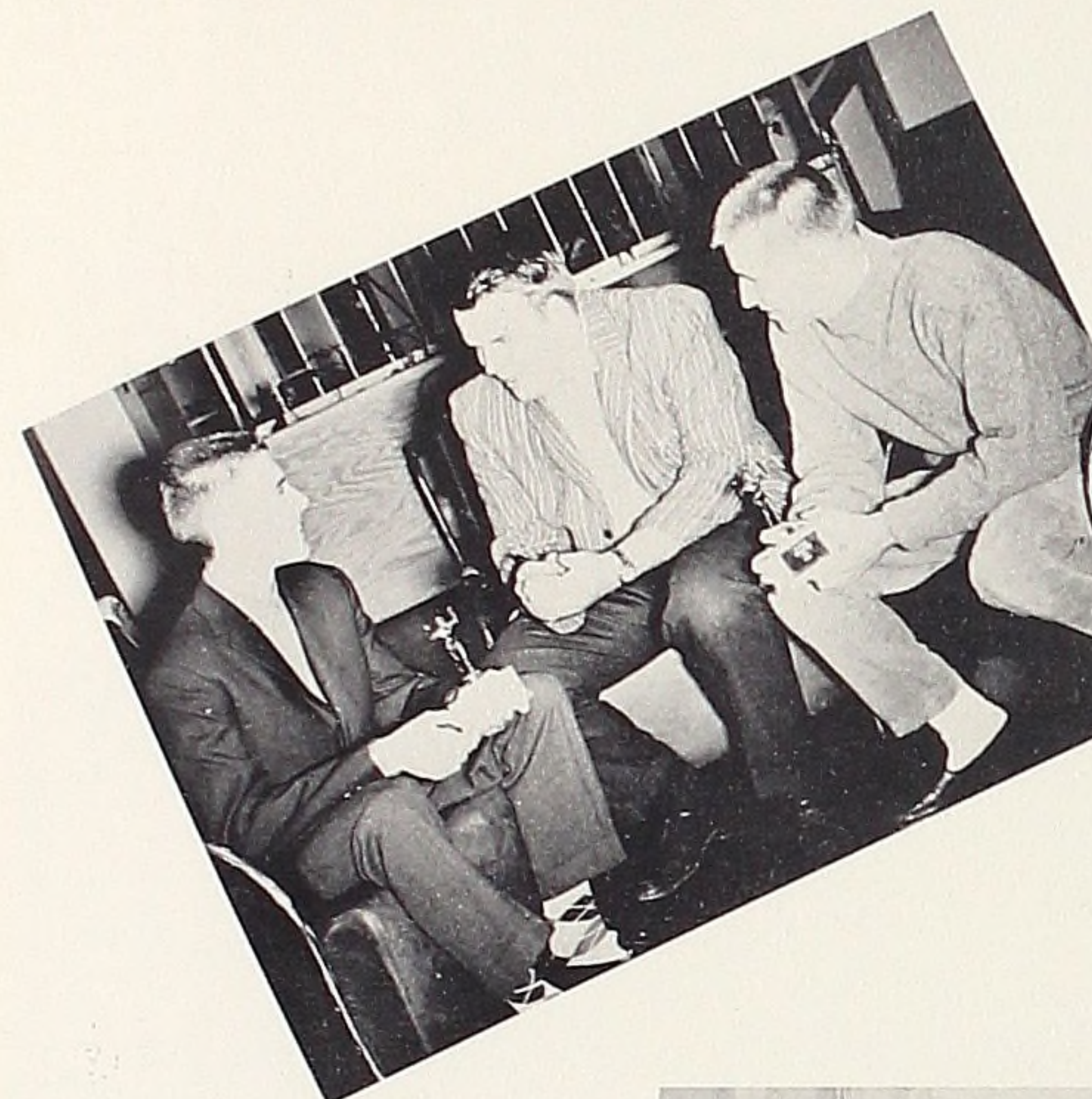
JJC was easily defeated in a great team effort as Fraley, Klasin, Seeburger, Haver, and Ferguson all finished within the first eight places.

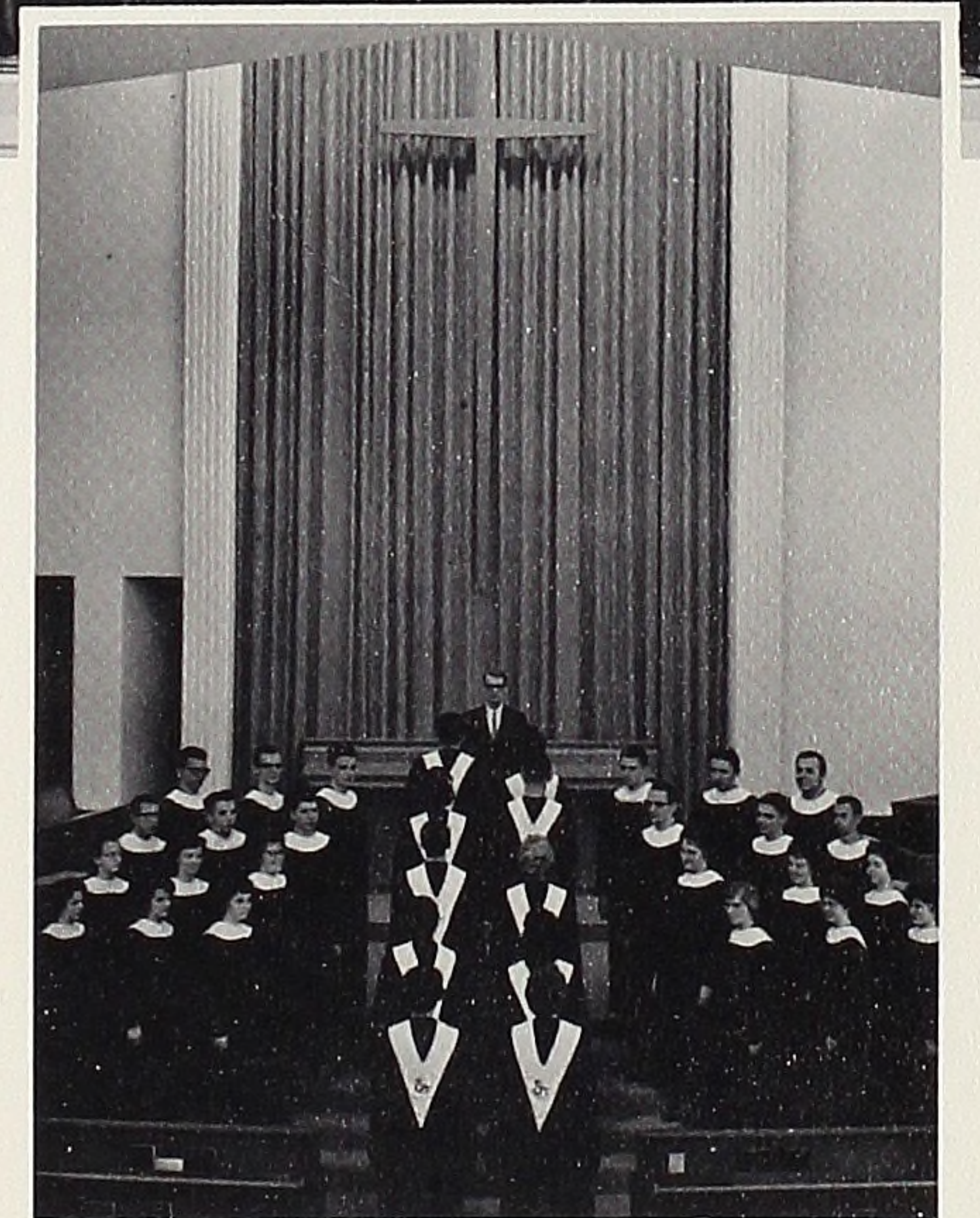
A Cappella
