
September 1947—A Junior at last! This year proves to be exciting. We are looking forward to great accomplishments.

Leaving the restaurant, we stopped to get corsages for the evening at SCITTINE'S Floral Shoppe.


The evening was spent in an opera house where MISS McADAMS performed in a scene from "The Egg and I."






RE-DIT STAFF







INTRAMURAL FOOTBALL


Field Day was again held this year, as is the custom at S. A. J. C., with awards going to the individual winners of each event as well as to the champion, both class and individual.





